The Montreal-Toronto fiver, running at a speed of forty miles an hour, struck e broken rall, the engine being ditched and the entire train left the track. Engineer Grant was burled beneath the locomotive and his fireman was hurled some distance into an adjoining field.

The escape from death of many of the other passengers and train crew is considered misculous, as two of the coaches were badly smashed by coming in contact with the overturned engine. There were, however, not more than fifty passengers on the train, and comparatively few in the cars which bore the brunt of the shock.

The train was a heavy one, consisting of the baggage, mail and express cars, six day coaches, two Pullmans and diner. Had not the engine overturned. The wreck is believed to have been dule to the action of frost heaving and breaking a rail.
