EVENTS IN BOSTON.

Boston, Feb. 6.

A novel and very ingenious application of mechanism for utilizing the pressure of the street water mains to drive wate. to the top of any building at the shortest possible notice, has been invented by Mr. S. R. Russell, of this city, and appears calculated to work a radical change in the present system of checking incipient conflagrations, especially in hotels and tall business blocks. By Mr. Russell's machine the water from the street main may in an instant be applied to set in operation in the basement a turbine wheel which in turn works a rotary pump of sufficient power to send a strong stream to any desired height. THE SPINAL MENINGITIS. This disease which was so prevalent among horses about a year ago, has been prevailing to some extent in several of our large stables lately, although, so far it has not been attended with any of the alarming symptoms shown in the malady upon its former visit. The stables of the Highland Horse Railway have had quite a number of cases, but all are improving, and there is only one horse so ill as to have to be supported in slings. Some of these which have been in a bad condition are now at work, although their appearance indicates unfitness for the heavy labors incident to the hard travelling. In the stable of the Broadway Railroad et South Boston, there are many cases, some of them quite severe, there being more than a dozen cases which have to be supported by slings. The weakness in the hind quarters is such

that they have no control over their hind legs, and offer no resistance to being swung around at will by any person. If the sling breaks or is not soon enough applied, the animal sits upon its haunches like a dog. with its fore legs stretched out in the effort to rise.
