**LONDON.**  
Great Changes—Holborn Viaduct and  
Thames; Embankment—The New  
West End—Belgravia Eclipsed—  
The Suburbs—Hampton and  
Highgate—Nests in Kentish Town  
—Projected Improvements—Fate  
of Government—A Greater Lon-  
don.

LONDON, May 15, 1873.

**HAUSMANNING LONDON.**

Of all people the English most hate  
change; yet they are forever undergoing  
it. But changes of all sorts in England  
are so gradually wrought out, work on so  
silently, as the oak grows, and present a  
little alteration to the eyes of any single  
generation, that the varied aspect of  
things, moral and material, does not  
strike people till they have been some  
time accomplished. The London of to-  
day, for instance, is as different from the  
London of a century ago as the English  
Constitution of the early years of George  
the Third has changed almost beyond re-  
cognition. No one who has not visited  
this big conglomeration of cities, towns  
and villages twice—once ten or fifteen  
years ago, and again within the past year  
or so—can have any idea of the growth of  
the suburbs, or even of the improvements  
which have changed the appearance of the  
heart of the metropolis itself. The build-  
ing of the great Holborn viaduct and  
the clearing of the Strand, which were  
magnificent enterprises, have been mor-  
phosed into the district between Holborn,  
Newgate and the Bank into a wholly dif-  
ferent quarter. The descent of Holborn  
Hill, and the ascent of Ludgate, was one  
of the striking incidents of the new Lon-  
don, that valley was the scene of many  
an historic act, and the chronicles  
of old London abound with romances and  
escapes of the urban gorges through  
which runs Farringdon Street, another  
mighty change wrought when the  
Thames Embankment was first begun.  
That designation has a common-place,  
uninteresting, engineering sound, and  
the stranger to London can get no other  
conception of the Embankment  
than that it is a mere bolting-up and  
clearing of the Thames river, and he  
must see it to appreciate what a wonder-  
ful piece of workmanship it is, what a re-  
volution, and what a grand improve-  
ment and adornment of London it is.  
Here is a spacious terrace, bordered  
by splendid granite walls,  
with rows of trees and carriage drives,  
beautiful sun-dials, and a fine  
seats disposed whence one may take the  
curious view of Thames, which extends  
from Westminster to St. Paul's. The  
change which the Embankment has made  
in the face of the city, and the way in  
which it takes the place of crowded,  
filthy slums of the old London, and  
vagrant fishermen, full of gloom and  
want and dreary density. All and light  
have been let in there, and what was one  
of the most wretched parts of London  
has become a favorite resort for the  
pleasure ground for all the world. A  
wide new street, or rather avenue,  
is to be cut through from Trafalgar  
Square to the embankment,  
which is to demolish the historic old  
Northumberland House. This will be a  
man of London with a vengeance; what  
Trafalgar Square will look like without  
this venerable mansion with its rampart  
top on the roof, I shrink from picturing  
to myself, but the new avenue will cer-  
tainly give a very striking coup d'œil  
from the Nelson monument, as well as  
be a very substantial blessing to the  
London crowd. Meanwhile it is im-  
possible to take a drive along Piccadilly,  
Bond Street, Regent Street, Baywater, No-  
thing Hill and Pall Mall without being  
struck by the constantly increasing archi-  
tecture of the new squares and  
streets of the wealthy. Time was when  
the old Mansions of Westminster built  
Belgrave Square, which so put to shame  
artistic old Grosvenor Square, was  
"Belgravia," as it was called, and was  
thought to be the very scene of splendor  
in private dwellings. I could point you  
out a score of neighborhoods further  
westward, which outshine Belgravia in  
exterior luxury, as well as in the  
interior. Now there are rows on rows  
of houses, picturesque in construction,  
occupied by clerks and even the higher  
class of artisans, who may now go for a  
penny by the Metropolitan Underground  
Railway to their places of business in the  
"city" in from fifteen to twenty minutes.  
Think of it! You may live within sight  
of Whitehall's Stone on Highgate Hill  
and have a glimpse of Barons Bardinot  
Court's umbrageous park on the hillside,  
and yet within a quarter of an hour  
yourself on Change, in the midst of the  
moneyed men, and gazing on old Wall  
and the bronze nose opposite the Bank!  
And Hampton and Highgate, those  
country villages where the banknotes used  
to spend their "Sundays out" under the  
trees and on the miniature moors, are  
transformed into suburban scenes quite  
enchanting as anything roundabout Paris.  
I fear Coleridge would scarcely know his  
beloved Highgate should he return to it,
