New Forests for Great Britain.

E. T. Allen.

A shipment of seven hundred pounds of Douglas fir seed was recently for-warded from the Dominion Forestry Branch seed-extracting plant at New Westminster, B.C., to Great Britain.
This is the final shipment of seel colfected in 1921. The total quantity of son was: Douglas fir, 4,000 pounds; Sitka spruce, 3,000 pounds; and western hemlock, 100 pounds. As tree seed ern hemicok, 100 pounds. As tree seed is very small and light, ranging from an average of forty-three thousand to the pound of Douglas fir to four hundred thousand seeds to the pound of Sitka spruce, it will be seen that many millions of seedlings will be germinated from these shipments for planting in the extensive reforestation scheme which the British Forest ry Commission has in hand.
