Playing with matches by children caused a blaze to break out at 71 Heins avenue at about 8:20 o'clock this morning. Some cloth in the sewing room caught fire. The blaze had been put out, however, by the time the fire brigade arrived, which was in short time.

Doon Again Prosperous.

"Things are looking better for our town. The empty houses have practically all been taken up," Mr. Heris, G.T.R. agent at Doon said today. The reason is the coming of the Elora Flax mill to the village. The company has brought a number of employees to the town and things are beginning to be active in the former plant of the Doon Twines company. It is expected to have quite an increase of flex this year in the Doon district.

Disposal of This Afternoon

Adjournment in the theft cases involving liquor and 'oil' found in two barrels in the G.T.R. car in which the three defendants a week ago pleaded guilty was made until three o'clock this afternoon. Crown Attorney Bowly not being able to present.

In connection with these cases another charge followed. To a charge of breaking the Order-in-Council of 1918 prohibiting the importation of liquor from another province. Mr. Peter Wagner, of Petersburg, pleaded guilty. The two barrels of oil containing liquor were consigned to him. A fine of \$200 was imposed this morning which was paid.

Adverse Criticism ruled out.

Some for may urge that the raising of money for the Great War Veterans' Fund should be done by taxation. There is reason to the argument but no provision has been made in the estimates and, in any event there will be no injustice, provided each citizen subscribes according to his means and, in addition, there is more true sentiment attached to the voluntary offering.

Again, it may be argued that only the well-to-do should contribute. No. The boys fought for no one class of the community but for all, and all, therefore, are under obligations to them. Hence the appeal is to everyone and it is not intended to overlook anyone. Pledge cards, calling for instalment payments spread over one year have been prepared for employers, wage earners, salaried officials and every one who earns money and all will be seen.

The Committee expects to receive over five thousand subscriptions in Kitchener and Waterloo totalling \$25,000 or more—an average of \$1.00 per head of population and of \$5.00 per subscriber. Let each one give his or her share, payable in monthly or quarterly instalments for one year and a fund will be placed in the hands of the Trustees that will enable them to provide a home for our soldier lads that we can be proud of. We owe it to the boys. We can say Nay?

Much Export Business.

Canada's export business is experiencing a tremendous boom, due to after war conditions and the facilitating of export shipments by Dominion shippers. Detroit is one of the large importing centres for Canadian building materials such as lumber, sand and gravel, and foodstuffs, such as grain and vegetables.

This is proved by the May report of the Customs Office for the port of Detroit. Last month 136 vessels entered that port from Canada and 259 cleared for Canadian ports. In May 1918 only 120 vessels cleared from Detroit for Canada. While a good percentage of these vessels were passenger liners, practically every freight and passenger boat brought merchandise from Canadian ports for Michigan markets.

Grain from Port Arthur and other Canadian ports in that vicinity is being handled mainly in Canadian bottoms. This is attributed to the scarcity of American vessels for the grain trade between Canadian and American ports. Detroit building concerns are drawing on Canadian resources for the bulk of sand and gravel supplies this season, because of inability of the railroads to assure prompt delivery of such shipments to that city.
