The trouble not only remains, but increases. There have been some new outbreaks of rabies in this part of the State—at Orange, where dogs were bitten in that town and Warwick; in Northfield, West Wareham and Canton. The collar of one dog, which was shot in Hampshire county, showed that the animal belonged to Torrington, Conn., which illustrates how far a mad dog is liable to roam, spreading trouble along the way.—Springfield Republican.
