First returned to Parlt. for present seat in Commons at last g. e. A moderate Conservate on questions of general public policy. Was strongly opposed to Confederation in the interests of N. S., and joined in the movement for Repeal; on the failure of which, and in consequence of the financial concessions made to N.S. in 1869, he declined further opposition, and has since generally supported the Macdonald-Cartier Cabinet.—Digby, N.S.

SCATCHERD, THOMAS. [North Middlesex.]

Eld. s. of the late John Scatcherd, Esq., a native of Yorkshire, Eng., who emigrated to U.C.; 1821, and at the time of his death (1858), represented West Middlesox in Leg. Assembly, Can., which he had also done in the previous Parlt. B. at Wyton, Nissouri, Middlesox, Ont., 10 Nov., 1823 Ed. at the London District Grammar Sch. M., 25 June, 1851, Isabella, dau. of Mr. Thomas Sprague, of Yarmouth, and grand-dau. of the late Elias Moore, Esq., a mem. for Middlesox in the U.C. Legislature. Called to the Bac, U.C., in Hilary Term, 1848. Sat for West Middlesox in L. A., Can., from g. e. 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal; opposed to the present Govt.—London, Ont.
