Copy of a LETTER from Lieutenant-Governor Campbell to the Governor-in-Chief, Barbados.

ST. VINCENT.

No. 12. Lieut.-Governor Campbell to the Governor-in-Chief, 19 October 1846. Sir.

St. Vincent, Government House, 19 October 1846.

In reply to your Excellency's despatch, No. 524, 7th October 1846, enclosing a Circular calling for a Return of Lighthouses, I have the honour to report, that there are no Lighthouses upon this island or its dependencies. This may perhaps be allowed to me as an opportunity of remarking, that dangerous coral reefs extend to a great distance on the southward and westward of the small islands in this government, both along their coasts and out to sea; they are terminated seaward by an isolated and lofty rock called "Sail Rock," so that vessels steering to the south of it will clear them. A Lighthouse upon this rock would be of much service, as it is directly in the track of the Royal Mail steamers, on their passage from Barbados to Grenada, and numerous sailing vessels pass in the same direction. I have not visited "Sail Rock," and, therefore, cannot speak as to the facility of placing a Lighthouse upon it; but in the event of its being found an arduous undertaking, a position may be found on one of the small islands called
