Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 19th inst., I beg to inform you that the survey referred to in the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve, is required at the earliest date and should not be delayed for any ordinary reasons.

In addition to the limits of the surrendered tract and the 999 year lease, it is desired that you should survey and permanently mark the limits of the land in the surrendered tract recently sold to the Ontario Limestone and Clay Co. Limited. These lands consist of the following, the South half of lot 4 and that part of the South Half of Lot 5, North of the Salmon River, also those parts of Lots 2, 3, 4 and 5, Con. 2, North of the Salmon River.

The lines between lots are not to be run. The extra lines to be run are the West limits of Lot 4 in the First Concession and Lot 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ in the second Con. As you will require to run a part of the Con. line between the First and Second Cons. you will please run the remainder. That is to say, survey and post the said line from the Salmon River West to the Reserve boundary and post the adjacent lots; one post at each side of the road allowance. Use $\frac{1}{2}$ inch round iron posts, three feet long throughout the entire survey squared for six inches from the top and marked with the numbers of the adjacent lots. The posts may be obtained at the nearest blacksmith shop.
