Mrs. Quin!an to use the land in question unless she has a right of way; and, on the other hand, the Dept. is not prepared to pay a right of way for her, nor is the New England Co. disposed to allow her to use the right of way which she has forced through their property.

In consideration of these facts, I think it would be advisable for you to see Mrs. Quinlan personally in this matter and urge upon her the advisability of her acceptaing the first offer made by the Dept., viz: to pay for her improvements and she to vacate the premises. By adopting this course, litigation and expenses will be saved her.
