CABINET CONCLUSIONS

Use of enemy patents; international agreement

1. The Secretary of State, referring to discussion at the meeting of August 26th, reported that the interdepartmental committee set up to review German patents held by the Custodian of Enemy Property had now submitted their report after consultation with government departments and agencies and private industry. The report recommended that Canada become a party to the international agreement (London Accord"), on disposal of former German patents in allied countries which was open for signature until December 31st.

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Under the basic principles of the Accord, German-owned patents would be placed in the public domain or continuously offered for licensing without royalty to the nationals of all participating
