Ottawa, Jan. 23.—The mass meet-sing in the Russell Theatre Saturnay evening, addressed by J. P. Writtey, was a rousing success. The theatre-mentic holds about 2,500 was pace to the doors. The Liberals who were exchered by the sanguine utterances of Fremier Ross the previous evening expericaced a chilly sensation where they heard Mr. Whitney's reply backed up by fact after fact.
