CASE FOR CORSETS.

A Dainty Convenience Made From Ribbon and Lace.

A neat little case for the best corsets is made from ribbon and lace. Measure the ribbon to a little more than twice the length of the corsets. Double the ribbon and set it together with fagot

ing. If the ribbon is not wide enough add two or three rows of narrow rib bon, fagoting them together for the sides of the case. Finish the top with a frill of lace. For the drawstring set on a beading and run through this a ribbon matching the color of the flower

Delicious Jumbles.

Delicious jumbles may be made by the following rule: Cream a cup of butter or other nice shortening (never, of e, lard) with two cups of sugar Add four well beaten eggs and stir the mixture into three scant cups of flour sifted with two heaping teaspoonfuls of baking powder. If the butter is fresh about half a teaspoonful of salt fresh about half a teaspoonful of salt will be necessary. To one-half the dough add half a cupful of grated chocolate after melting it. To the other half add the juice and grated rind of an orange. Mix the two batters slightly together and roll them out very thin. Cut them, if desired, into fancy shapes and spread them on a buttered tin or sheet of iron. It is always better to butter the pan than to dredge it with flour, as is sometimes dredge it with flour, as is sometimes done. The cookies will not have so dry a taste if the pan is greased. The same recipe may be used, with the substitution of lemon for chocolate and orange, for lemon cookies.

Secret of Bright Eyes In Age. An elderly woman whose bright eyes are the envy of some of her younger friends says that she always keeps on her dressing table a pot of pure landin with which every night she anoints her eyes, using a little vaseline to make the landin less waxy. This mixture is ap-plied to the lids and surrounding tissue of the eyes and also under the eye-lashes. The eyehrows are treated in the same way. In the morning the eyes are washed with warm water and a little pure soap, care being taken to keep the latter out of the eyes. When the treatment is neglected the eyes feel thred and are red lidded and dull.

To whiten linen take one pound of fine white soap, cut it up into a gallon of milk and put it over the fire in a kettle. When the soap has quite melted put in the linen and boil for half an hour.
