Common butcher cattle were slow of sale, but prices held steady at last Thursday's close. The bulk of those cattle should have been left at home and fed for a couple of months, as there are far too many of them coming on the

Cows and bulis were firm, choice bulls selling at from \$9 25 to \$9 75, with a couple of extra choice at slightly higher

Choice cows sold at from \$8 50 to \$9

and good cows at \$7 50 to \$8. Milkers, springers, stockers and feed ers were all steady at last week's closing

The sheep and lamb market was with out change. There were only 104, all told, on sale, choice lambs selling at 14c to 15c lb, and light, handy sheep at 10c to 10he lb.

Veal calves were 50c to 60c lower in price, while grass calves were steady.

Hogs-As usual on Monday, hogs went to packers at last week's quota tions, but are quoted for the balance of the week at \$13 25 f.o.b, \$13 75 fed and watered, and \$14 weighed off cars.


Charles M. Schwab says that many persons would be surprised to learn that the Bethlehem steel plant is the largest ordnance factory in the world, exceed ing by 50% the capacity of the great Krupp works in Germany. The plant now has 70,000 employees and its payroll averages \$6,000,000 a month.
