Widening their attacks, which they have been directing against the rfetreating Germans in the sector of the Somme, the British struck still further north, and in a series of assaults on a broad frotn, with Arras more or less the pivotal point, they drove the Germans from scores of important positions, penetrated far into the German lines and caused heavy casualties.
