FORTY-SEVENTH YEAR
BRITISH Army
Heavy Fighting Expected by the Allied Leaders on the Italian Front

London, March 25.—(New York cable.)—The most interesting piece of news from the war theater is the announcement of the visit of the Italian front of Sir William Robertson and General Weygand, representing General Nivelle.

It can be assumed that the presence of the British chief of staff and the representative of the French headquarters staff at the post of the Italian supreme command that heavy fighting is expected that war zone. Whether or not allied chiefs expect Hindenburg to launch an offensive against the guarded southeastern French border (Savoie) through Italy, with hope at the same time of eliminating a military factor, is a matter of great speculation here. This connection it is interesting to note that the German submarine force has been concentrating their efforts against shipping bound for Italian ports, with the possible hope of a shortage of necessary and food supplies.

The Italian front has been mentioned in the past.

ANOTHER RAIDER?

Vancouver, B. C., March 25.—A despatch to the Canadian News from Tokio says that a German raider has been seen in the Pacific. The names of the vessel were not disclosed. The presence of a German raider in the southern sea and in the Indian Ocean has been reported several times lately, officers reports having been given on the effect that two British merchant ships had been sunk in that vicinity.

RETURN OF ALL SPANISH VESSELS
From Allied Ports to Harbors Demanded by Government

Madrid, March 25, via Paris.—official note made public to-day Premier Count De Romanones stated that the Spanish government entered into negotiations with German government to obtain return to Spanish ports of a risk Spanish vessels now in a port in a German bank of five dred marks per ton burden. It would not be used for traffic with Spain, according to the note. It gave a promise not to insure a government guaranteeing merchant ships voyaging in the zone. The Spanish government refused to accede to these conditions. Negotiations are continuing.
