**Sunken Ships Recalls War.**

Thirty miles east of Kingston, Ont., in the St. Lawrence river, lies the hulk of the Canadian steamer Sir Robert Peel, which was fired and sunk during the Patriotic War of 1837-38.

It was on the night of May 30, 1838, that this steamer, on route from Prescott to Toronto, Ont., with nineteen passengers and \$20,000 in specie for paying the troops in Upper Canada, was taking on wood at what was then called McDonnell's wharf, when a company of men led by Bill Johnson, known as the hero of the Thousand Islands, disguised and painted like Indians and armed with muskets and bayonets, rushed aboard, shouting: "Remember the Caroline!" The night was dark and rainy. The passengers who were asleep in the cabin, together with the crew, were ordered ashore and had to leave. The Peel was then pushed out into the river and burned and sunk. All the attacking band escaped punishment. Several were tried at Watertown, N.Y., for arson, but were acquitted.

Johnson kept a hotel for years at Clayton, N.Y., formerly known as French Creel. He was a native of Lower Canada and claimed to be a confidential friend of William Lyon Mackenzie, leader of the rebellion in Upper Canada in 1837. His daughter, Kate Johnson, furnished the band with supplies while they were outlawed and in hiding among the Thousand Islands.

**Dr. Johnson's Prejudices.**

He foretold the day when "the pendent spectator would survey with equal security the marts of trade and fields of battle"; but he deemed it needful, says Sir Sydney Lee in the London Times, to restrict the knowledge and practice of the art of flying to people of virtuous instincts, who should apply it solely to purposes of peace. With horror Johnson imagined "a flight of northern savages," who should "hover in the wind and light with irresistible violence upon the capital of a fruitful region." On the first experiments in ballooning, which were made in Johnson's latest year, Johnson remarked that balloons would serve no use until we could guide them.

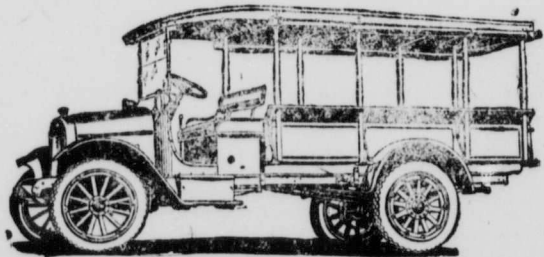
