#### WORLD AND SISTERS.

HOW THEY START ON THEIR JOUR-NEY IN THE NEW CENTURY.

mer Mary Proctor Describes the Lesson, Which Is Also Intensely Interesting at This Juncture in the His-

It is interesting to trace the path of the planets as they circle around the sun, pursuing

Their wandering course-now high, now low, then hid,

Progressive, retrograde, or standing still. During the course of a year they are to be seen creeping slowly across the sky, the twelve zodiacal constellations forming their background. These constellations form a circle extending quite round the heavens, and eight degrees on each side of the ecliptic, or sun's apparent highway. If it were possible to see the stars in the daytime we would see the sun outlined against a different side of the zodiac each month.

The planets, in the order of their distance from the sun, are Murcury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune. Mercury is the nearest planet to the sun, going around it once in eighty-eight days. It is not easy to obtain a glimpse of this planet as it is usually lost in the glare of the sun's light. However, the most favorable dates for seeing it during 1901 will be about Feb. 19, June 15 and Oct. 12, when it will be visible as an evening star low down in the west after sunset. On April 4, Aug. 2 and Nov. 201 it will make its appearance in the east as a morning star just before sun-

In the olden times the Grecians. seeing Murcury sometimes as a morning star and sometimes as an evening star, supposed there were two and named them Apollo, star of morning, and Murcury, star of evening. The latter name is esnecially appropriate, since Mercury was the god of thieves, and this little planet steals more light and heat from the sun than any other planet in the solar system. The heat varies from four to nine times as much as we are accustomed to.

Imagine what would happen planet Earth if the sun's heat were increased fourfold, and the disastrous results that would follow the still greater increase tenfold. life on earth would cease, and its surface, blistered by the blazing heat and the oceans boiling and ascending in clouds of steam, would utterly transform our little world.

Added to this, the noted Milanese

astronomer Schiaparelli called attention in 1889 to some permanent markings on the surface of Murcury, showing that the planet always keeps the same side turned to the sun. Consequently, there must be perpetual day on the sunlit side, while on the other side of the planet night must reign supreme. If there were oceans on Mercury at one time they must have been boiled off from the hot side long ago and condensed into ice on the cold side. Mercury at present then is a planet quite unfitted to be the abode of organic life. Next to Mercury we find the planet Venus, known to the ancients as Phosphorus, the morning star, and Hesperus, the evening star. It surpasses all the stars in brightness, and sometimes is seen by daylight, provided one knows exactly where to look for it. During 1901 Venus will be a morning star till April 30

and an evening star the rest of the Mars, the planet named after the god of war, is rightly to be found on visiting terms with Leo, the Lion, during the month of January, advancing . toward the bright star Regulus by the month of February, going a little beyond that star during the month of March. Then it begins to retrace its steps during the month of April, and is just above Regulus in May, and about five de-grees southeast of it in June. Mars will be a morning star till Feb. 22,

and then will be an evening star the rest of the year.

The planets Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus will remain the guests Sagittarius, the Archer, throughout the year, while distant Neptune will occupy a lonely position between Taurus, the Bull, and Gemini, the Jupiter remains a morning star till June 30: then it becomes an evening star for the rest of the year. Saturn will be a morning star till July 5, and then an evening star for

the rest of the year. The reason Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune remain in one constellation during the year is due to the fact that these planets are not only at a greater distance from the sun than Mercury, Venus, Mars and our own planet, earth, but travel more slowly. While Mercury hastens around the sun at a speed varying from twenty-three to thirty-six miles a second, it only takes eightyeight days to make its yearly trip. Next comes Venus, moving at the more dignified pace of twenty-two miles a second, requiring only 225

days to go once around the sun. Then comes our own planet, earth, which, compared with Mercury, apparently crawls along, but, marvel-ous to relate, its speed is nevertheless about nineteen miles a secondi.e., about seventy-five times as fast as a cannon ball.

Can we realize a speed so tremendous? An express train moves at a rate of a mile a minute; multiply that velocity by nineteen and it becomes nineteen miles a minute, but we must further multiply it by sixty place, to dry.

and then only could it keep pace with the earth as it rushes around tration. We stand at the rifle range to see a rifle fired at a target 1,000 feet away, and we find that a second or two is sufficient to carry the bullet over that distance. earth moves nearly one hundred times as fast as the rifle bullet. Nevertheless, it must move with this velocity in order to complete its

yearly trip around the sun.

Mars moves at be rate of fifteen miles a second, and takes 687 days in circling around the sun. Jupiter travels even more slowly, at rate of eight miles a second, and takes twelve years in going around the sun. Consequently, it remains a whole year in each sign of the zodiac in turn, and that is why we find Jupiter remaining in the constellation of Sagittarius from January till

Saturn journeys at the rate of niles a second and requires twentynine and a half years to complete its trip around the sun. Therefore, it remains a little over two months in each zodiacal constellation. Uranus slowly advances at the rate of four and one-third miles a second, requir ing eight four years to complete trip. Thus, it remains seven years in the same constellation.

Neptune, which is thirty times as far from the sun as we arc, creeps around the great ruler of the planetary system at the tardy pace of three and one-third miles a second, and takes 164 years to complete the circuit. This accounts for the fact that when Neptune visits one of the zodiacal constellations, or houses of the sun, as they are termed by . the Chinese, he comes with the intention of staying for the rather lengthy period of a little over thirteen years. There would seem to be some danger of his wearing out his welcome. Just at present he occupies a position midway between Taurus and Gemini, being in neither one constellation nor the other.
