The Canadian Manufacturer, the organ of the Manufacturers' Association, expresses perfect confidence in the future of Canadian industry, and does not entertain any doubts as to the permanency of the good times which the country now enjoys. It has been trying to ascertain the views of leading manufacturers throughout the country by asking the following questions:

Will the present activity in manufacturing in Canada continue?  
Are the present preparations for increased business justified?  
Will the market support the expansion?

Will there not be a general collapse sooner or later?  
Of the result of the effort our contemporary says:

"Characteristic of the replies, sent to The Canadian Manufacturer in response to an inquiry as to the future prospect was confidence in a continuation of the forward movement. The temporary tightness of the money market has weighed on the minds of Canadian manufacturers. They are busier than ever before, paying higher wages, planning for greater business and receiving a more ready market for the output of their factories than ever in their history. Some few expressed the wish not to have their opinions published, but in every case they maintained a tone of confidence and saw little reason to fear a cessation of activity. In one or two instances a reaction is expected, but the consensus of opinion seems entirely opposed to the thought."

## RED CLOVER SEED CROP.

A circular recently received from T. F. Raynor, Seed Inspector for Ontario, gives some very valuable information to farmers. On account of partial failure in Canada and the United States of the 1906 crop of red clover seed, large quantities were imported from Europe for the past season's trade. The supply was depleted early in May and the retail prices have been unusually high in consequence.

No red clover seed is being carried over for next season's trade. The red clover crop, not only in Canada but in the United States and in Europe, is now reported to have suffered severely from prolonged cold weather during March, April and May; and on account of probable reduction in the yield of hay and other fodder crops, but particularly because most fields of red clover are killed out in places, it is anticipated that the areas left for red clover seed will be considerably below the average for Canada and that the supply of good, clean, No. 1 seed will again be short for the season of 1908.

In view of the present conditions of the trade in red clover seeds and of the red clover crop, it is the desire to advise farmers in the Province of Ontario that it will be well for them to consider the expediency of utilizing as far as possible those fields or portions of fields of red clover that can be made clean by weeding, and of saving them for the purpose of seed.

red clover seed are obtained from the second crop—the first crop being pastured off until about June 20th, when all roughs and weed growth should be trimmed with a mower having the cutter-bar tilted well up. With this method, the ravages of the clover seed midge are largely avoided. If the first crop be cut for hay, the cut should be taken as early as possible.

In taking the second cut of red clover for seed, it is well to remember that each of the weeds—ribgrass, catchfly, curled dock and others—produce from 10,000 to 50,000 seeds, or about one hundred times as many seeds as are produced by a red clover plant. Further, that the spread in prices now paid in favor of good, clean, No. 1 seed will continue to range from 50 cents to \$2.50 per bushel, and may amount to from \$1.00 to even \$10.00 per acre, and in any case is more than double the cost of the labor required to pull and remove such weeds from the seed crop before it is cut. Before marketing, farmers are invited to send a small sample of their grass or clover seeds with their name and address enclosed, which sample should be accurately representative of the bulk lot, addressed to the Seed Commissioner, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and within three or four days they will receive in return a statement showing its percentage purity and the kinds and proportion of noxious weed seeds, if any, that are contained in it. With such information they will better know its value when compared with the current quotations for seeds of the various grades of quality.

## AULD LANG SYNE

FROM PLANET FILES OF HALF A CENTURY AGO

From The Planet files from Oct. 10, 1867, to Oct. 24, 1867.

A very sad accident occurred on Saturday last, resulting in the death of two children. Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Baxter were driving in an open buggy to Morpeth and when going up a hill the horse got frightened and began backing down. It backed over a gully, which is five feet deep, thus upsetting the buggy on the top of the occupants. The horse then fell on top of the buggy, thus holding the occupants from getting free. Mrs. Smith was so crushed that she could not move, and after forty-five minutes they were freed. When freed one child was found to be dead, caused by suffocation from the robe, and the other was so bruised and exhausted that it died in its mother's arms in a few minutes. The case is a very sad one, and the entire sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved families.

Two valuable horses belonging to Mr. Taylor were drowned at Wallaceburg on Thursday. They were crossing on a ferry, and becoming unmanageable, jumped off into the water and were drowned.

Mr. Tupper has been offered Mr. Archibald's place in the Privy Council, but he declined to accept. The Hon. Joseph Howe will now, I have good reason to know, be asked to take Mr. Archibald's place. In the event of his acceptance, it is expected that Mr. Archibald would be made Governor of New Brunswick. Dr. Tupper will not return here from the medical convention at Quebec, but proceed thence to Halifax.

It is stated at Ottawa on pretty good authority that the Federal Government claims the right to appoint the entire magistracy of the country.

The Spanish Government has ordered that a general census be made of all slaves living in the Island of Cuba from and after Oct. 1, and all free colored people be provided with warrants showing their proper registration under a penalty.

Coburg has a small baby. It is a female, and at birth weighed one pound.

Mr. Spurgeon baptized 359 people last year.

In the village of Morpeth on the 7th inst., Mrs. Wm. Wilson, went into the barn in search of some eggs, and while in the hay, left a board broke or gave way, and that lady

fell to the floor, breaking an arm and three of her ribs.

Mr. Robert Kenney, of Aymer, Quebec, purchased two heifers at the Kingston exhibition for \$450.

The Government have decided on giving a grant of \$150 to every volunteer band in an efficient state on the 30th of June last.

A. P. McDonald and Currie celebrated their political victory by a dinner at Strathroy on Thursday, Sept. 26th.

Jenny Lind has lost the splendor and strength of her voice.

Thursday next, the 20th of October, has been named by the Lord Bishop of Toronto to be observed as a day of general thanksgiving in that Diocese for the abundant harvest of the year.

A laborer employed on the G. W. R. near Glenora was knocked down an embankment by a passing train on Friday evening last and sustained severe injuries.

Canadian produce is gradually edging its way into the principal British markets and commands a high figure. We observe by a cable despatch, dated Liverpool, Oct. 14th, that peas are quoted firm at 50s. per quarter for Canadian.

James O'Riley, Q. C., has presented to the Governor-General ten petitions bearing six thousand signatures for the release of Fathen McMahon. The first was signed by both the Protestant and Catholic Bishops of Kingston, their clergy and leading men of all denominations. Mr. O'Riley is sanguine of success.

About nine o'clock to-night, Oct. 17th, as a militia negro regiment was parading through the streets at Baltimore, some twelve or fifteen shots were fired in the street. One white man was instantly killed. A number of whites soon arrived and great excitement prevailed. A large police force was soon on the ground and prevented any further disturbance.

Mr. Merriam, of Sherbrooke, has raised a squash weighing 102 lbs.

The Toronto Hospital has been closed. Cause, want of funds to carry it on.

The English champion swimmer has swam 1,000 yards in 17 minutes. This is the fastest time on record.

## Latest Fashion Hints

### The Latest in Accessories for the Summer Months

Women who know the value of little things in dress will be interested in hearing:

That the new summer glove is pale buff or straw color; it comes in glace and suede kid, silk or suede fabric, and as the rage promises to be great, you had best lay in a number of pairs while stocks are complete.

That shoes and stockings come to match all the shades of cloth or silk, and while dark tan footwear is in greatest demand, there is a general tendency toward the various brighter colors, as well as toward black patent leather pumps with black, grey or white cloth uppers.

That neck ruffs for summer wear are short, edged with ribbon or ribbon velvet of the same shade, and finished with long loops and ends of velvet ribbon.

That the box pleats edged with fine knife pleats in lawn for shirt waists can be bought by the yard and this is much better than the home-made article.

That the new turnover collars of colored linen to match tub frocks are all worked in white eyelet embroidery.

That the newest hair ornament for evening coiffures is a spray of wisteria with rhinestone dew drops.

That the pompadour ribbon ruchings used to trim hats can be bought ready made by the yard.

That the small hat pin, however pure its metal or fine its jewelry, is out of date, while the up-to-date hat pin is vulgarly large, in stone, metal, imitation of tortoise, amber, jade, crystal and semi-precious stones with a number made from straw or raffia work to match the wide variety of hat colorings. Nothing short of a ball two inches in diameter is worth noticing this season.

That the newest veils for traveling, motorings, yachting, etc., are of green net.

That all net and many chiffon and other soft veils show triple rows of velvet ribbon around the lower edge and sides.

That cretonne enters into summer accessories of dress, for there are cretonne parasols and cretonne belts, bound and appliqued with leather.

That some of the newest belts are woven of straw with straw buckles.

That some of the prettiest parasols are of plain silk with scalloped and button-hole stitched edges set off by embroidered dots all in self tone, while other plain taffetas parasols show insets of fine batiste embroidery with edging to match.

That gold bracelets inlaid with black have been revived and link bracelets showing crystals and semi-precious stones come to match every tint of gloves.

That black velvet ribbons, wide or narrow, according to the height of the neck, are used for dog collars, rhinestone buckles being preferred as the finish.

That hand-embroidered linen handkerchief bags, change purses, card cases and chateleine bags will be carried with tub frocks.

That black suede hand bags with metal clasps and trimmings are used by women in half mourning.

That the effort to introduce fringe as a summer trimming has failed, but tassels are used to finish off silk scarfs and the soft scarf effects run through rings or knots of ribbon on either side of dressy blouses.

That the newest pompadour and Dresden ribbons for sashes have gold or silver edges at least half an inch wide.

That grass is used instead of foliage on the smartest hats.

That a costume is not complete unless a dainty brooch appears at the collar, and that all collars are high, curving up well at the nape of the neck and under the ears.

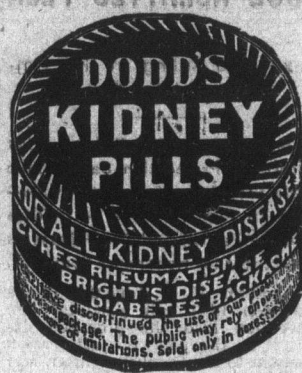

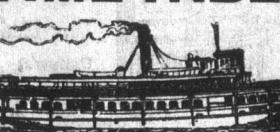

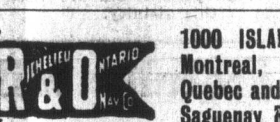
