Otherwise Betting at the Race Track isn't Against the Law.

Toronto, Nov. 6.—Discussing the decision of the Court of Appeal handed out on Saturday in connection with betting on the Woodbine race track Judge Winchester said yesterday that in his opinion the judgment was correct, according to law. But this judgment does not, nor will not, prohibit betting. It only does away with the bookmakers working under cover. If they do business with a roof—even an umbrella—over their heads, they are breaking the law. If they stand under an umbrella and make bets they can be prosecuted. If his honor is correct, the handbook men will have a chance, as no one will have to "weigh in" the Jockey Club being unable to collect any rental.

Colonel Olcott Badly Hurt.  
Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 6.—Colonel Henry Steele Olcott, of Advair, India, president and founder of the Theosophical Society and co-worker in her lifetime of Helena P. Blavatsky, has been seriously injured in a railway wreck in Italy yesterday by a member of the society in Kansas City. Beyond stating that he had been placed in a hospital and is "in a bad way," no details are given. Because of his advanced age fears for his recovery are entertained. He was on his way home to India from the Chicago convention.

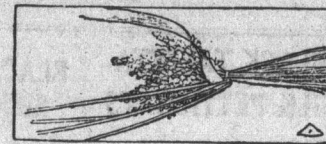

## SWEET LAVENDER.

SOME HOMELY USES FOR THIS FRAGRANT, PUNGENT HERB.

An Invaluable Adjunct For Imparting a Delicate Perfume to Linen. How to Make a Dainty Lavender Cone and Flat Sachet.

Who does not love lavender, from time immemorial associated with sweetness and cleanliness? The homely purple spikes and dull gray leaves seem to belong by right to the careful housewife and her linen cupboard.

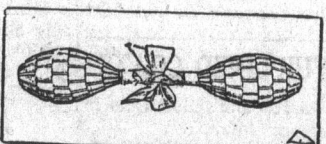


A LAVENDER CONE.

and, although many are the perfumes nowadays, it is doubtful if in the long run any is so popular as sweet lavender.

The illustration shows how to make a lavender cone, an invaluable adjunct for imparting a delicate perfume to linen. Lavender sprigs when thrown loosely are apt to shed their bloom and thus create a confusion of odd pieces. The cone, however, obviates this disadvantage.

To make a lavender cone take about seventeen to twenty-seven lavender sprigs, the number depending on the size of the flowers. Bind them firmly round the heads with a piece of linen thread. Now take a piece of baby ribbon and put it round one of the stalks, keeping it quite close to the head, and sew it with small stitches. Bend all the stalks when you have tied them and bring them over the flowers, and darn the ribbon over and under.

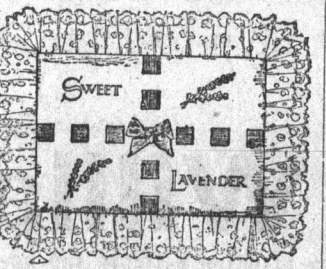


THE CONE COMPLETE.

neath the stalks, keeping it as even as possible until the cone is finished, drawing it well into shape at the same time. You must not forget to leave a long piece of ribbon for a dainty center bow. The other cone is made exactly in the same way. The stalks of both cones are fitted into each other, tied with thread and bound over with ribbon, tied in the center. A pretty idea is to have contrasting ribbons for each cone. Thus green and lavender ribbons look well, white and green, lavender and pink, etc.

Some people prefer a flat lavender sachet, and the third illustration is designed. The flowers are first picked from the stalks and put in a soft muslin bag. The outer case is also composed of muslin, threaded down the middle and sides with mauve ribbon. The lettering and spray are worked in graduated shades of mauve and the whole finished up with a pretty lace trim.

The muslin case can be easily washed, and of course its size depends on where you intend placing the sachet. Both methods of using lavender are commendable on account of their small expense in making, also for the charming results obtained, and any one would say a hearty "Thank you very much" for a present of either a lavender cone or sachet.

## PARLIAMENT OF FRANCE.

Deputies Assemble and Carry Ministry Policy by Immense Majority.

Paris, Nov. 6.—Parliament re-assembled yesterday. The Chamber of Deputies was crowded when the Cabinet Ministers entered, and all eyes were on Premier Clemenceau and War Minister Piquart, but there was no demonstration of an extraordinary nature. The Premier, when he read the Ministerial declaration of policy, was followed attentively and evoked several rounds of applause, especially when he announced that the law separating church and state, as applied, would insure full exercise of liberty and conscience.

A motion approving the Government's program was carried by the great majority of 395 to 98. The debate which followed the declaration of policy was confined exclusively to the matter of the separation of church and state. There was a perfect volley of interpellations with the object of learning the intention of the Government in the matter of application of the law of separation.

## BRITISH JACKIES MUTINY.

Recent Order of a Short Statured Officer to Kneel.

Portsmouth, Eng., Nov. 6.—A mutinous outbreak on the part of five or six hundred sailors Sunday night necessitated the immediate mobilization of the entire force of the naval barracks here in order to prevent the affair from developing into a serious mutiny. The men had assembled in the gymnasium where the senior officer, a man of short stature, wishing to administer a reprimand for breach of discipline, ordered the front ranks to kneel so that he could see the men in the rear.

The order was resented and some of the sailors who refused to obey were arrested. Their comrades, aggrieved, ran amuck, wrecked the canteen and other premises, started to break out of barracks with the intention of wrecking the quarters of the obnoxious officer, and were only prevented from so doing by the fixed bayonets of an overwhelming force.

A number of the men who attempted to break out of barracks also were arrested.

**CONSERVATIVE SWEEP.**  
Warning to the Government.  
London, Nov. 5.—To appreciate the extent of the sweeping change in London a few figures will be necessary. Three years ago, with a Unionist Government in power and with London represented in the House of Commons almost entirely by Unionists out of twenty-eight London boroughs seven returned Progressive or Liberal and in most cases the majorities were decisive and overwhelming.  
Today with the Liberal party newly arrived in power in unprecedented strength, out of London's twenty-eight boroughs only two certainly and one doubtfully remain to the Liberals. In a few others they form a respectable minority, in which they have practically ceased to exist. East, west, north and south all tell the same story. The poor and rich populations, the business and leisure classes alike, have abandoned the Liberal party in these elections.  
In the borough elections in the provinces there were similar results.  
The Unionists are now loudly expressing the hope that the House of Lords will keep a stiff upper lip over the education bill, and in the face of the declaration of Chancellor of the Exchequer Asquith Saturday night, that the Government would remain firm on the education bill, make the Government either drop the bill or appeal to the country.
