Trial Court, before Britton, J.

Williams v. Alpena Oil and Gas Co.

Judgment (G. A. B.) in action tried without a jury at Chatham. Action to recover compensation for work actually performed by plaintiff in drilling for oil or gas in the township of Raleigh, and for damages for the non-performance by defendants of their part of a written contract entered into between the parties on 25th October, 1904. Held, applying Dalrymple v. Scott, 19 A. R. 477, that where before the time for the completion of a contract one party notifies the other that he does not intend to complete, that notification may be treated as a breach, and at once acted upon. Munro v. Brett, 8 E. and (B. 738, and Sumper v. Hedges (1898, I Q. B. 873, distinguished. Forter v. Wilson, 27 C. P. 543, and Pollock on Contracts, 4th ed., p. 259, referred to. And upon the evidence plaintiff was prevented from fully performing his contract by the fault of defendants. Judgment for plaintiff for \$900, with costs. Stay for 39 days. G. A. Sayer, Chatham, for plaintiff. O. L. (Lewis, Chatham, and R. L. Gosnell, Blenheim, for defendants.

Brantford, Sept. 30.—The jury in the Bennett case, after being out for five hours, returned a verdict of "guilty." The charge of the judge finished at 6.30 last evening and the jurymen at once retired. At 11.30 they came back and asked for information regarding the evidence of David Garlow, who contradicted the story of Kick the backtradicted the story of Kick, the back-bone of the alibi. This was given and a shudder passed over the crowded a shudder passed over the crowded court room as a premonition was seen in this regarding the coming verdict Five minutes later the jury returned

with the verdict of "gullty."
While the foreman pronounced the fateful word, the condemned man sat with impassive countenance and never once betrayed his emotion. No scene was made by the crowd in the court

Justice Anglin declared the court adjourned until 9.30 this morning, when Doyle and Bennett will receive their boyle and Bernett will receive their sentences. In commenting upon the verdict, he stated to the jury that he did not see how any other verdict could have been reached by them. 
