INCENDIARY ENDANGERS LIVES.

Barrie Baker is Accused of a Very Serious Offense.

Barrie, Nov. 22.—Alfred S. Carstead, a baker and restaurant keeper, is under arrest on a charge of incendiarism. Yesterday morning fire was discovered in his shop, but luckily was extinguished before it had got any headway.

Had the fire got a good start the loss would have been heavy and perhaps attended by loss of life, as the store is on the Queen's Hotel block and the hotel was crowded with guests.

Justice Teetzel, who was presiding Monday at the non-jury sittings, occupied a room on the first floor, immediately over the burning store. Carstead a few years ago was a farmer on Oro Township, and had been in business in Barrie only a year, coming there from Ontario. He was arraigned before Police Magistrate Radenstern yesterday, pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried by jury.

Colonization Congress Opens.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—A special from St. Jerome, Que., says: The colonization convention opened here yesterday with a large attendance of delegates from every part of the province. Among those present on the platform were Hon. Dr. Reaume, Hon. Mr. Tessier, Senator Casgrain and Senator Levesque. The congress was opened by Hon. Mr. Prevost, Minister of Colonization for the province.

Longshoremen Won't Work.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 22.—There was absolutely no change yesterday in the longshoremen's strike situation. The Parisian, which arrived Monday night, is the first boat of the winter season, and on her the laborers refused to work unless the new schedule of wages was paid. The owners refused to accede to this demand and the cargo was discharged by the ship's crew.

TEN THOUSAND A YEAR

Subscribed to Political Fund by the Equitable Company.

Mutual Life Paid the Same Sum Frequently and New York Life a Smaller Amount But Only Occasionally—Senator Platt's Evidence Before the Insurance Committee—Dewey's "Cantankerous Friend" Unearthed.

New York, Nov. 22.—The identity of Senator Dewey's "cantankerous friend from up the river" was disclosed in the session of the Armstrong committee insurance investigation yesterday, by the testimony of John A. Nichols, a lawyer under retainer by the Equitable Life. Mr. Nichols had written Senator Dewey a letter referring to an individual in the above terms, which letter was read at the session of the committee Friday, when Dewey was on the stand. The senator said he was unable to recall who was meant, but yesterday Nichols disclosed a series of payments to V. S. Manning of Albany, a former actuary connected with the investigation of insurance companies in 1877. Nichols detailed the payment of sums of money over a period of time to Manning as an inducement to give up his business as actuary, in which capacity he believed Manning was a menace to the Equitable. Nichols said he was paid a retainer from the Mutual and the New York Life for the same duties, that of "taking care of Mr. Manning," as Mr. Hughes characterized it. The payments by the Equitable for Manning were made to Nichols and Nichols said he was done to protect Manning.

Senator Platt a Witness.

Aside from this testimony, the feature was the appearance of Senator Thomas C. Platt, who was carried up stairs in a chair. He told of the contributions of the insurance companies to the campaign fund of the Republican state committee. The Equitable, the Mutual Life and the New York Life were the only insurance companies that made such contributions, he said. The Equitable Life contributed regularly \$10,000, the Mutual Life the same sum frequently, and the New York Life a sum not as large, and only occasionally. These moneys always were delivered in cash to Senator Platt's office by messenger, and he turned them over to the state committee. The senator said he supposed he was expected to influence legislation favorably to the insurance companies.

An Assemblyman's Story.

Assemblyman James K. Aggar of Westchester was called to explain the finding of his cards with the words "Mr. Hyde says to pay him," attached to a voucher for \$1,000 which the Equitable paid Thos. C. Platt. The voucher bore Husted's endorsement. Aggar said he knew nothing about the money, nor did he know how his card came to be used for such a purpose. He knew A. C. Fields, but never knew of his receiving money for political purposes. Fields was politically active in Westchester, where he also lived, Aggar said, and generally elected where he set out elect. Aggar talked with Fields in Albany while a member of the insurance commission, and had called on Fields socially in the house maintained by the latter. Aggar said his relations were somewhat strained with Thos. D. Husted, and as the latter is dead, he asked to be excused from going into an explanation of the matter.

Bavarian's Pilot Suspended.

Quebec, Nov. 22.—The court which investigated the cause of the running ashore of the Allan steamer Bavarian thirty miles below Quebec on the 3rd inst., rendered judgment yesterday morning. Pilot Paul Leclanche is held solely responsible for the accident, but the court taking into consideration his previous good record dealt leniently with him and only suspended his certificate for the space of two years. The captain and officers of the ship are completely exonerated from blame.

Montreal Trolleys Collide.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—Two St. Denis street cars were damaged in a collision yesterday, and five people sent to the hospital to have wounds dressed. A baker's cart was struck by one car which stopped suddenly and caused the following car to run into its rear.

Charged With Burglary.

Niagara Falls, Nov. 22.—Freeman Clark, G. T. R. baggage man, was arrested by Detective Greenwood, and taken over to the Niagara Falls, N. Y., police, who have a charge of burglary against him.

Burglars Secure \$80.

Port Hope, Nov. 22.—The residence of N. Pethick was entered at 2 a. m. yesterday and over \$80 secured from the trousers of two gentlemen visitors. Five dollars was taken from the purse of Mrs. Pethick, which hung in the clothes closet downstairs. No trace of the parties has been found.

Young Man Missing.

St. Johns, Que., Nov. 22.—Hector Brosseau, 18 years of age, is missing. A hard felt hat, such as worn by the missing young man, has just been found in the river, and it is feared he went to the wharf and accidentally fell in the river and was drowned.

Two Years For Illegal Voting.

New York, Nov. 22.—For illegal voting at New York's recent election, Edward Meade was yesterday sentenced to Sing Sing Prison for not less than two years nor more than three years and six months. He pleaded guilty to voting twice.

Soldiers Under Suspicion.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—An enquiry has been going on here relating to charges of irregularities against two officers of the 13th Sweetbush Dragoons. The finding will be reported to Ottawa. The amount involved is \$150.

Cabled \$2,000.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—The sum of \$2,000 was cabled yesterday morning by the president of the Baron de Hirsch Institute for the relief of Russian Jews. This is approximately the amount subscribed to this time.
