The need of better sidewalks must be very apparent to all who visit as well as to those who reside in Wolfville. Their present uneven and untidy appearance is very annoying to all who have to use them.

The Provincial Exhibition.

The great Fair at Halifax opens on Saturday, the 23rd. The I. C. R. will give special excursions at particularly cheap rates on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and the D. A. R. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The I. C. R. will extend a siding into the grounds for the convenience of exhibitors of sheep and swine. The latter came in crates and had therefore to be trucked from the siding to the show pens.

There are over 200 more entries for cattle than last year. The poultry exhibit will be the largest and best that has ever been shown at any provincial exhibition.

An Indian village will be one of the novelties of the fair. A colony of wigwams with a lot of Micmacs in characteristic costumes making baskets, miniature canoes, bead work, etc., will present an interesting and picturesque scene.

The massive scene for the "Storming of Peiper Kotal," the great military spectacle, has been completed and will be arranged so that it can be taken down while the trotting races are taking place, so that the people on the grand stand can have a full view of the back stretch.

Balloon ascensions will be made every afternoon from the grounds of Prof. Walcott, one of the most distinguished ornithologists of America, whose contributions to popular and scientific literature are highly valued and widely read.

The covering on the covered bridge across the river to Avonport has been torn up for repairs and there will be no crossing for some days.

The services in the Methodist church last Sunday evening was missionary, under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary. There was an able address by the pastor, a full report by the Secy.-Treas.

The first passenger train of the Coast Railway ran into Pabucio on Monday, with a train load of passengers. The cars had been rugging to East Pabucio only, a distance of about four miles from Pabucio harbor. The road bed is all gravelled, and it is expected that the trains will be running into Pabucio by the end of this week.

To Visit Wolfville.

The executive of the Provincial W. C. T. U. has recently secured the services of Mrs. Addie Northam Fields as organizer for Nova Scotia. Mrs. Fields has had a large and successful experience in work of this sort.

Mrs. Fields is a national and world's organizer and a born reformer. Even as a child she showed a decided tendency to setting things right, if she thought them wrong.

After a course in special training in the Normal school of Illinois, she taught school for five years, developing a remarkable talent for training children. Her public work began as president of a mission band and later as president of the Loyal Temperance Legion of her city.

In 1894 Mrs. Fields was invited by Lady Henry Somerset to go to England for three months to help establish the work there. The three months lengthened into eighteen before the work was fully accomplished.

She is an excellent speaker, uniting a rare fund of knowledge with a gift of language to express it. She tells the truth in a way easily remembered and passed on, and her work, while not arousing so much enthusiasm at the time as some, has a reputation of standing.

Added to this she has, as Katherine Lente Stevenson, national corresponding secretary of the W. C. T. U. says, "that most useful and rare quality of stick-to-it-iveness, and when she starts out to bring about results she usually achieves her end."

Grand Pre.

At the "Dyke Meeting" on Saturday it was decided to turn cattle on the dyke Friday, the 15th. This late date was chosen to enable proprietors to clear the dyke of oats. The feed was sized 3 acres for a cow and 4 for an ox. Feed is all sold, fifty cents to one dollar per acre being the price.

Hay has been selling freely at 35 and 36 per ton. Teams have come from Berwick and Waterville and carried away tons; there are orders from Sackville and other parts of N. B. for pressed hay, and inquiries from Boston. Oats will average 50 bushels per acre and will go over the market. Potato a-ri-bering and are a fine crop, but there is considerable rot in some fields. Apples were badly shaken down by the wind storm; some orchards losing 40 to 50 barrels. Report is current that W. H. Chase & Co. and Rand & O. J. donk have fixed the price of apples for this season. Growers who do not like their price can ship and pocket the profit. It is safe to say that a few speculators in Kings county last year made a clear profit of \$100,000.
