In connection with his indefatigable labors he was reminded of the words of the Apostle, 'Not slothful in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord.' Other speakers, also, bore testimony to Mr. Storrs' valuable services. After the transaction of other business a very harmonious and profitable meeting was brought to a close with the benediction.
