

FORMER SHERIFF A. R. ANDERSON NOW ENDORSES TANLAC

CHURCH DEDICATION AT FLORENCEVILLE

The Methodist church at East Florenceville, which has been undergoing extensive alterations and enlargements since the early spring was re-dedicated to the worship of Almighty God and the service of the community on July 10 with the imposing ceremony provided for such occasions. The dedication services proper were conducted in the morning the Rev. H. E. Thomas, President of the Methodist Conference, preaching the sermon. He was assisted in the service by the pastor, Rev. F. A. Wightman, and Rev. E. C. Turner of Deler, and Rev. Sam. Howard of Woodstock. Mr. Thomas's discourse was based on Matt. 16:19 and was an interpretation on the symbol of the "Keys of the Kingdom" as touching the authority of the church. It was most appropriate to the occasion.

In the afternoon the house was again filled with worshippers when the service was conducted by the pastor and addresses on stirring themes were delivered by Rev. Turner, Thomas and Howard.

In the evening a number had to be turned away so great were the numbers seeking admission. At this service Rev. F. E. Bishop, pastor of the Baptist church was the special preacher.

Special music of a high order was rendered at all the services by a splendidly trained choir, Miss Estella Hunter being the organist. On Tuesday a congregation social was held in the new memorial hall or basement.

The alterations are such as to make it practically a new building. It was moved back from the street twenty feet and raised up four feet and a new front built on entirely changing the appearance. A basement was excavated and walled up with concrete making a fine Sunday School room with various apartments for classes and other forms of social work, the finish is of hard pine. The auditorium proper has been enlarged and beautified. New windows of stained and leaded glass add greatly to the appearance. One complete window is in the form of a memorial to the late Gordon S. Hunter. An excellent set of concrete steps, with an ample platform gives a ready entrance to the main doors between two pillars resting on concrete bases.

The following brief summary of the history of this church will be read with interest:

The earliest available records concerning organized Methodist work at East Florenceville is for the year 1875. The place was then a mere country road. It was that year made a regular appointment of the old Upper Kent Mission with a service once in three weeks. Services had, of course, been held from time to time for a few years prior to this

In the year above mentioned the Rev. Wm. Penna (now retired) became the first regular pastor, and the late Alonzo Taylor, Esq., the local steward. The amount raised for ministerial support that year was \$25.00. Since that time the cause has had a steady growth and last year the amount raised for the same purpose exceeded \$500.00.

Records concerning the building of the church are exceedingly meagre. The late Alonzo Taylor seems to have undertaken the task almost single-handed. This was, as far as can be learned, in the year 1889, fifty years ago, making this the jubilee year. The church has been remodelled at least three times, the building of the spire and choir alcove being the chief enlargements previous to the present. For a number of years it was used by the F. C. Baptists as well as the Methodists.

The present extensive improvements have been undertaken largely as a Peace Memorial and the church will be in future known as "The Peace Memorial church."

Florenceville was organized into a separate circuit in the year 1899 with the Rev. Thos. Allen as the

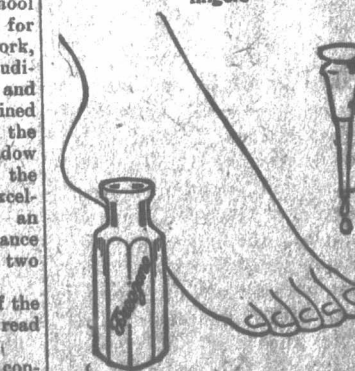
