Tuberculosis is Most Gaping Wound In Bleeding France

Thousands of Broken Frenchmen From Behind the German Lines Are Shipped Back to France Through Switzerland to Spread Tuberculosis Through Former Homes.

Paris, Nov. 8.—Arrangements were made today to dedicate and occupy next week a tuberculosis hospital at Bligny, furnished by the American Red Cross. The building will provide for 300 beds and will be turned over by the American Red Cross to its French owners who began the building before the war and were unable to finish it. This summer the American Red Cross, seeing the pressing need of tuberculosis aid in France, called the directors of the hospital to gather and offered funds to finish the building.

At first the French could not understand that the Americans had no ulterior motive in desiring to finish the hospital. But when the Red Cross Commission made it plain that the Americans had not desire to control or operate it, but merely wished to help France with her most tragic problem, the French lent every effort to help the building. The completion of this hospital is a part of the American Red Cross programme to give our European Allies, and particularly to France, an invaded country with acute needs, such social and economic first aid as may be achieved with our available funds.

And tuberculosis is the most gaping wound in bleeding France. Tuberculosis, if it is not checked, will conquer France after the German guns have been forced across the Rhine. For during the three years last past conditions in France have combined with devilish fatality to make the land a vast culture ground of the tuberculosis germ.

Two million people in France are homeless. Many of them have been living in cellars and barns behind the German lines, their own homes having been destroyed by the invaders. From back of the German lines are scattered through France a menace rises that may not be blinked. Now add to the menace the danger of "Darius" Wednesday morning low clouds and rain considerably hampered the artillery work. In the afternoon, however, weather conditions improved and some successful artillery and photographic work was carried out by our airplanes. Our low flying machines fired many rounds at hostile troops and transports and in the course of the day a number of bombs were dropped on enemy trenches and billets.

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THREE CANADIANS GET COVETED V. C.

The Awards Made for Conspicuous Bravery and Devotion to Duty of Men.

London, Nov. 9 (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—The London Gazette announced the award of the Victoria Cross to three Canadians. They are Major O'Kill Massey Learmouth, M. C. of Quebec, late of the Canadian Infantry, "for most conspicuous bravery and exceptional devotion to duty. During a determined counter-attack on our new positions this officer, when his company was momentarily surprised, instantly charged, and personally disposed of the attackers. Later he carried on a tremendous fight with the advancing enemy. Although under intense barrage fire and mortally wounded, he stood on the parapet of the trench and directed the defence in such a manner as to infuse a spirit of the utmost resistance into his men. The other two Canadians are Sergeant Major M. Robert Hanna and Private James O'Rourke, both of the Canadian Infantry. Both of the latter were awarded the Victoria Cross for conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty.

London, Nov. 9.—At the stormiest political convention ever held in London, Major Hume Croxall was last night, selected as a Conservative Union candidate, after the Great War Veterans had withdrawn from the meeting, making all sorts of threats. The soldiers refused to have anything to do with the matter, and leaving the straight line candidates in the hall, paraded the streets, and later held a meeting of their own. They are strongly behind Lieut. Col. Wm. G. Coles, and declare they will fight for him to a finish against any and all parties.

Liberal Nominated.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 8.—At a gathering of Laurier Liberals at Sault Ste. Marie, yesterday afternoon, Laurence O'Connor, of Sudbury, was chosen as their standard bearer in the forthcoming Dominion election. He will contest the riding of East Algoma against George H. Nicholson.

A Laurier Candidate.

Montreal, Nov. 8.—Ex-Alderman Lapointe, former M. P., announced here last night that he had decided to accept the Liberal nomination in St. James division again, as Sir Wilfrid Laurier wished it. The nomination was tendered to him some months ago. Mr. Lapointe referred to the Military Service Act as "an immoral and unjust law," adding, "I stop there. He advised all the young men to register, so that they could vote, as the government would not try to enforce conscription during the general elections. "If the government were sustained at the polls, constables and officers would be expected at the doors," he said.

A Seat for Graham.

Windsor, Ont., Nov. 9.—South Essex Liberals may nominate Hon. G. P. Graham at a convention to be held at Essex this afternoon.

Nominate Blondin.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—Lieut. Col. P. E. Blondin, Postmaster General, who overseas, was yesterday offered the nomination as Win-the-War candidate in Wright county, Quebec.
