## PUBLIC HEALTH ACT JUDGMENTS ARE TO BE COLLECTED

Municipalities Against Which Orders Were Obtained Must Pay Up

## GOVERNMENT DISCUSSED WHOLE QUESTION HERE

Unpopularity of Health Act Has Already Sealed Fate of Some Supporters

"The Public Health Act is on the books and the municipalities that have not paid have got to ante up," are the words in which a member of the Cabinet expressed the decision of the provincial government at their meeting here last week on the problem of whether the administration should proceed any further with the collection of amounts from the unwilling municipalities which have resisted payment.

Moreover, it was learned today that there has been no letup in the official action to enforcement payment of the amounts ordered in court decisions in the cases which have already been disposed of. On the other hand formal demands have been made upon Sunbury, Queens and Kings counties, the three municipalities against which orders have been obtained by the Department of Public Health and returns are expected from writs which have been issued against Kent and Albert counties within the next few days. It was learned this morning.

The Public Health Act and its unpopularity was the subject of some long and earnest discussions in the Executive Council Chamber during the meeting of the Government last week, during which Hon. Dr. Roberts endeavored to defend the Act and its administration. He told his colleagues that by a series of public meetings he hoped to bring the Act into a larger degree of popular favor, but practical politicians in the Cabinet frankly told their colleagues that the Act and its administration were bringing disaster to the Government more rapidly than some of the Ministers appeared to realize. They cited facts and reports to substantiate their assertions and already the Government are said to have heard from their supporters in more than one county to the effect that unless the Health Act is repealed or radically amended, the faddists expelled and a real house cleaning takes place, their political fate is sealed.

## PASTOR ATTACKS CHARITY LOTTERY

Rev. Z. L. Fash Declares That Gambling Spirit is Being Encouraged by Plan

The services at the George street Baptist church yesterday were largely attended. At the evening service the pastor, Rev. Z. L. Fash, completed a series of practical topics with an address entitled "What is the Pardonable Sin?" During the course of his sermon Rev. Mr. Fash voiced his emphatic disapproval of the lottery being conducted in the city for an automobile in connection with the fair under the joint auspices of the Red Cross Society and the Labor Council. It was a pity, declared the pastor, that the Red Cross and Labor Council should give encouragement to gambling in the city, and in so doing injure the moral status of the community; he added that this lottery should have the disapproval of every Christian citizen.

The Red Cross and Labor Council were worthy institutions, said the pastor, and the object of the fair a most commendable one, but these organizations should be condemned for the introduction of the lottery. The Red Cross, he added, comes to the churches for aid, which is freely given, and now by this lottery they are breaking down the very work which the churches have been trying to do in suppressing gambling. He felt sure that every Christian in the city was opposed to the use of gambling schemes for any charitable purpose.

## TWENTY WERE CONFIRMED

His Lordship Bishop Richardson officiated at Christchurch Cathedral for First Time Since His Recent Illness.

The first confirmation service held by His Lordship Bishop Richardson since his recent serious illness took place last evening before a large congregation at Christchurch Cathedral. A most interesting and instructive address was given by the Bishop, while the candidates, twenty in number, were presented by Very Rev. Dean Neales. Unfortunately, several of those who have been in the classes were prevented through severe illness from being confirmed, and it is expected that a supplementary confirmation service will be held before Easter. The class confirmed last evening consisted of 11 males and 9 females. At the morning service the Bishop, who is very much improved in health since his recent trip to the south, expressed his great pleasure at being home again and preached with his old-time eloquence and vigor.

## THE NEW G. O. C. IS COMING HERE ON INSPECTION

Colonel A. T. Ogilvie, D. S. O., to Make an Inspection of Military Property

## THE SUCCESSOR OF MAJOR GEN. MACDONELL

Commanded an Artillery Brigade in Canadian Forces in the Great War

Co. A. T. Ogilvie, D. S. O., who has succeeded Major General Macdonnell as general officer commanding No. 7 Military District, will arrive here from St. John this evening on his first tour of inspection in New Brunswick. He is to inspect the military property here tomorrow, as he has been here previously in other military capacities and has many friends here.

Colonel Alexander Thomas Ogilvie was in command of the Royal Canadian Artillery, which comprises all the artillery in Canada, when he was appointed to command this district. He commenced his military activities as a lieutenant in the 90th Regt. in 1889, then transferred to the 3rd Reg. Victoria Rifles, Nov. 20th, 1891, and promoted to the rank of captain Aug. 19th, 1892. He was appointed lieutenant in the 2nd Field Battery at Montreal Dec. 23rd, 1896, and promoted to the rank of captain Feb. 27th, 1897. On Feb. 28th, 1898, he was appointed a lieutenant in the permanent force and made a brevet captain Feb. 10, 1901, in the R. C. A.

He went to South Africa with the artillery and was appointed to the rank of captain on July 1st, 1902.

Promoted to the rank of major, Dec. 1st, 1905, and that of lieutenant colonel, 31st Dec. 1904. During the early part of the war he was in command of M. No. 11, British Columbia, later he proceeded overseas, and was in command of the artillery of the 5th Division. While in France he won the D. S. O., when in command of the 14th Brigade of the C. F. A. He was appointed to the rank of lieutenant colonel July 5th, 1917, and made a full colonel Oct. 19th, 1919, when he took over the command of the Canadian Artillery.

## RIFLE WANDERED ALL AROUND AFTER IT WAS STOLEN

Swede Arrested on Charge of Stealing Weapon at House Where He Boarded

## THE FOURTH OWNER GAVE IT TO POLICE
