Moquette Won Feature Race at Good Price.

London, Ont., July 8.—Continued fine weather, a large crowd and a fast track, assisted in making the second day of the London Trotting and Pacing Association meeting of four days one of the most successful in years.

The card consisted of four races, two for the harness horses and two for the runners. All four events were keenly contested, particularly the 2:17 pace, in which the favorite, Stonewall, was beaten.

In the 2:14 pace Ian Bars, the favorite, easily held his field for three straight heats. In the 7:8 mile run Generous Moor, who was sold recently by the Hon. Adam Beck, broke down, as did also Uncle Ned.

The first heat of the 2:14 pace found Ian Bars at the pole before the first turn was made. Romboigh followed with Anna V. Brimo. Crummer raced Lady Baxter along nicely for the first quarter, and easily passed Brimo.

The second heat was similar to the first so far as Ian Bars was concerned. Romboigh made an effort at the quarter and three-quarter pole with Anna V. Brimo, but in the stretch, Lady Baxter moved up again in this heat, but could not overtake Brimo, who was a good second.

Again, in the third, Ian Bars led for the entire trip, with Brimo second. Third position was keenly contested between Lady Baxter and Raymond L. The latter securing it by a nose. Stonewall always in a good position, closed in between the leaders a sixteenth from the wire, until the proverbial blanket would cover all three at the finish, Elk Girl winning by a nose from Miss Swift, who was a nose in front of Stonewall.

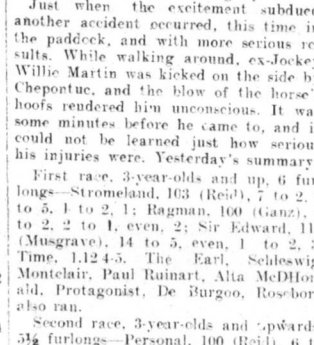

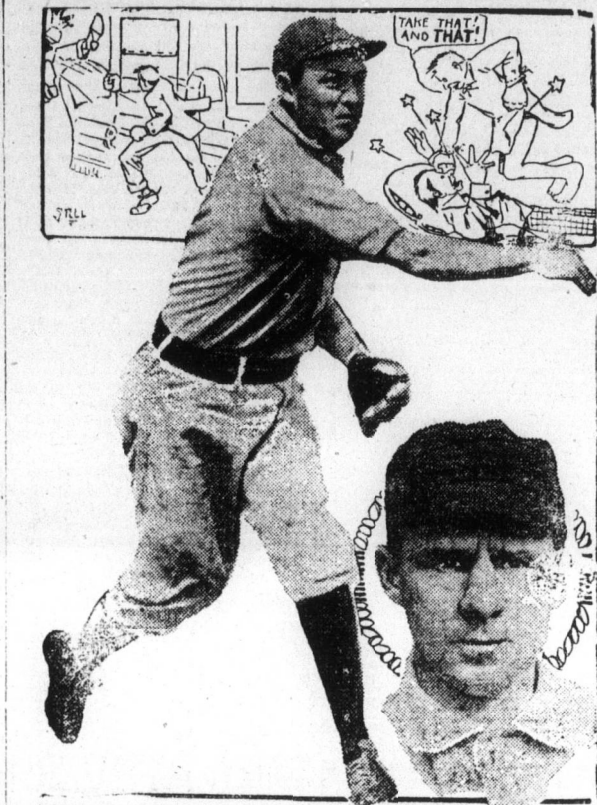
