"All those who can afford to pay are compelled to pay the communal authorities at the rate of four cents ties contribute to the relief commit tees one cent per diem per capita on trict, they obtaining this revenue from the tickets sold, or by public subscription in the districts through the national committee, under our supervision. These funds ultimate ly become available to us for the purchase of food.
