### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

His Excellency, Most Reverend Donato Sbarretti, Apostolic Delegate to Canada, is now on a visit to the Maritime Provinces. He arrived at Halifax on Saturday evening and will be in Charlottetown in a few days. Preparations are making to give him a reception worthy of his person and the honored and exalted office he holds.

The coal steamer Verax, from Montreal to Sydney was run into by the Donaldson liner Athenian in the St. Lawrence off the Isle of Orleans shortly after midnight Tuesday. The Verax had her starboard side stove in and she now lies on the beach. The Athenian appeared to be undamaged and proceeded on her way to Montreal.

Nearly three thousand boxes of strawberries were shipped from here by the steamer Princess yesterday morning. The strawberry crop is reported very short in Nova Scotia and consequently prices are good. Such large shipments show how the industry is growing in this Province. It is not so long since the first shipment was made from this Island.

Rev. Joseph S. Gallant and Rev. John Gaudet, were ordained priests by Bishop McDonald, in St. Dunstan's Cathedral at the half past ten o'clock Mass, on Sunday last. His Lordship was assisted in the solemn ceremonies by Rev. Dr. Curran as Deacon, Rev. Dr. McLellan as sub-deacon and Rev. Dr. Morrison as masters of Ceremonies. In addition to the clergy named, the following priests were present in the Sanctuary: Rev. Father Knapp, O. P., Rev. Dr. Chaisson, Rev. J. M. Beardon, Rev. Theodore Gallant, Rev. K. J. McPherson, and Rev. Father Power, C. S. S. R. Rev. Dr. Chaisson and Rev. Father Gallant assisted the ordinands, during the more solemn part of the service. Rev. Father Knapp preached a very eloquent sermon from the text: "Having loved His own, He loved them unto the end." His theme was the love of our Divine Lord for us, as exemplified in the Blessed Eucharist. To perpetuate this great and awful mystery and to continue the sacrifice of Calvary in the holy sacrifice of the Mass, priests were necessary. Hence the beautiful and solemn ceremony of the ordination, when the Bishop, in the Apostolic succession, ordained to the holy priesthood, the two young levites in the Sanctuary. This surely was occasion for rejoicing.

The United States National Democratic Convention for the nomination of a President and Vice-President, and adopting a campaign platform for the Presidential election in November next, met at St. Louis, Mo., on Wednesday last and continued to meet from day to day until Saturday. Indeed it was half past one o'clock Sunday morning before the convention finally adjourned. The name of former President Grover Cleveland, was greeted with enthusiastic cheers whenever mentioned; but the name of Bryan, who had been the Presidential nominee of two conventions, scarcely evoked a cheer. Judge Alton B. Parker of New York was nominated for President on the second day of the convention. He received 656 votes on the first ballot, then Idaho gave six and West Virginia three, making the two-thirds vote. It was then made unanimous. It took a long time to secure a Vice Presidential nomination. No one had been singled out by the leaders and different ones whose names were presented were unwilling to accept. It was this uncertainty that kept the convention so long in session. Henry W. Davis of West Virginia was finally nominated for Vice President.

The Militia Bill was taken up in the House of Commons Monday, and Sir Frederick Borden said the present system was far from satisfactory. Under the new Bill the general officer commanding will be dispensed with, and instead thereof will be a Militia Council, that council to be composed of the Minister as Chairman with four military men and two civilians. Everything in Council would be a matter of record, at any rate all conclusions would be recorded. The Principal Military officers would be the Chief of the General staff, Adj. general, Quarter master general and Major general of ordnance; and the two civilians would be the deputy minister of militia and probably the accountant of the department. For first time he would in this way be duly and regularly informed of all that was going on and would be in constant touch with the dept.

The officers of the Halifax Military Corps, which arrived at Sydney on the 11th, wondered why they were called there, as they could see no reason for it. The men on strike appeared to be orderly and well behaved in every particular. They expected to be called upon to do some fighting at once. The Halifax contingent was under Col. Irving. Things remained in this way until Friday when when a riot occurred between a Sydney Battalion of Infantry and some of the Halifax troops. Major Gillies is in command of the Argyll Highlanders of Sydney and between these and the forces under Col. Irving there was a clash, and in consequence the latter returned home. No new developments were reported on Monday. The Steel Company were reported to be making preparations and to have gradually commenced active operations in several departments and to be hiring as many men as make up plication.
