

What "Reporter" Says of Hr. Grace.

Editor The Evening Telegram:—Speaking to a straight Tory today, I referred to the report in the Daily News about the nomination of the Tory candidates—it is an infamous and false report, as there was not more than 130 men in the parade, and not more than 25 to 30 from Harbour Grace, the rest were heeled from up the Bay. Our people are not showing up like last election, they seem to be disconcerted, and out out, was his reply.

Piccott, himself, addressing some of the inner circle, of his principal supporters, deplored the want of interest taken by the supporters of the Government in Harbour Grace. Last year you had, said he, 100 on your watching committee, now you have not 40; how is this? Our opponents are watching out every move, they are sensible to our defects, the eyes of the whole country is looking at this District, upon its action hangs the fate of the Morris Government, and if we are to win we will have to make a mighty effort to conquer our opponents, who are leaving no stone unturned to accomplish our defeat, in fact they seem to be sleeplessly ready to grasp us by the throat and like the deadly tentacles of the octopus they seem to be entreating everyone of our strongholds, and with tigerish craftiness they have enlisted the services of the P. P. U. against us to bring about our defeat. You know that Harbour Grace proper has always been Liberal to a great extent, and I find that many of our supporters have fallen away from us, and to-day I am credibly informed that we have lost fully 100 votes in this end of the District. Now, I am not satisfied with heresy evidence, I have forced this truth upon some of our principal supporters who tell me that all through the town—from Keefer's Grove to Carbonate Road—we have very few voters, and I am told that by way of Water St. to Harvey Street and down the Phe Track Road to Courage's Beach many of our supporters have gone over to the enemy. Now, in Riverhead we have gained, but many of our supporters in this section have not yet returned from the United States, and we shall lose quite a number of votes in that way of course I have taken over by members of the party, myself the "Shanahans" and one of the Mackays, but I do not know how it will work out, as it may have a bad effect upon some of our supporters' up along who have no use for them, and the Riverhead people call them "clayey," but anyway their votes will count. We have also lost votes in this section. Such as the Norwicks, Davers and others. Kilfoyle tells me he has all the votes in the Gullies in his hip pocket, and that a little lime juice carefully administered to Jim Goltway and big Jim Messer would bring all the roses, cranes and whistles—some 15 votes over to our side both in the Gullies and the Thicket. At this point of Piccott's speech the redoubtable Tappin shouted, give him the rind, give him the rind. All the same those fellows up there will hang you up for sure every time. To be continued.

Reduced Taxation.

In last evening's Herald I was somewhat amused at P. T. McGrath's method of dealing with figures. He contends that under eight years of Bond Rate taxation increased from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000. Under the same process of reasoning it may be stated without fear of contradiction that under Morris's Rule of four years taxation increased from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000. Despite this fact the Graballs are proclaiming without a blush that they have reduced taxation. Do you know men of Newfoundland, that on the clothes you wear and that your wives and children wear Morris collects more duty than Bond ever did, and upon many an article that has gone up \$1.00 in price in the foreign market since Morris came into power the Morris Government is collecting from 35c to 45c more than ever Bond did, and all know to their sorrow how prices have soared in the foreign market during the last four years, and yet we are told that taxation has been reduced. He has also the merit of having introduced a new style into English literature. In all his writings he exhibits a power of picturesque narrative and a wealth of allusion which have never been surpassed.

BATTLE OF BALACLAVA 1854. One of the engagements in the Crimean War. During the progress of the battle occurred one of the most unfortunate episodes of the campaign. Through the wrong construction being put on an order, the Light Brigade, some 600 strong was sent to charge the entire Russian Army in position. Of course, the charge was useless, and the Light Brigade was nearly destroyed. Tennyson has immortalized the event in verse.
