Maska's Gigantic Frozen River as it Meets the Sea-The Mother of Icebergs-Rumblings and Roarings that Come as the Masses of ice Break Away from the face of the Lofty Cliff to Start on their Ocean Voyages.

The birth of an iceberg is strikingly described in a report made to the National Geographic Society by R. S. Tarr and Lawrence Martin, who headed the expeditions of the society to Alaska for the study of the behavior of glaciers there.

"There are periods when for an hour or two there is very little discharge and then periods, fully as long, when scarcely a moment elapses without the sound of icefalls from some part of the glacier front. It is possible that these differences are in some way related to the state of the tide, but we have not determined whether the periods of quiet and activity form part of a regular cycle or are merely irregular intervals due to accumulation of strain and relief from strain or to expansion and contraction under sunlight.

"While there are periods of relative quiet, they are not periods of absolute repose, and they occupy far less time than the periods of activity. Day and night the ice falls, and the reports that pass out through the air are so frequent that it is fair to speak of the glacier as almost ceaselessly acremoved to a part of the fiord to which the iceberg roar and the breakers on the coast do not reach."

THE PALM LEAF FAN. By GEORGE FITCH,

Author of "At Good Old Siwash." The palm leaf fan is a five cent substitute for a \$500 summer trip which is used with great success by millions of people.

The operation of this wonderful device is very simple. The performer grasps the fan firmly in his right hand and waves it back and forth thus producing a cool refreshing breeze about as violent as a stage windstorm. As the operator continues to work he produces a gentle perspiration. This evaporates in the breeze producing a delightful feeling of coolness, equal to that obtained in a \$4 a day room on the lee side of a summer hotel.

The palm leaf fan can be bought anywhere and can be carried around with no exertion at all, but many people are discarding it in favor of the mechanical fan which works by electricity and can produce a windstorm for 1 cent an hour.
