if the date of the election was deferred till late in May so as to ensure the returning men their right to vote.

The Premier stated that the date of the election has not been decided on. The Government could not agree with Mr. Walsh's suggestion.

Mr. Woodford (Hr. Main), and Mr. Downey (St. George's), approved an early election.

Following the passing of the Election Act, the House went into Committee on Supply, and the Minister of Finance, Mr. Cashin, introduced resolutions covering a vote of fortyfive thousand dollars for election expenses. In introducing the resolu-tions he contended that the election was made necessary by the action of the Legislative Council in setting April 30th as the time when the life of Parliament should end. He also pointed out that there were many big questions to be handled, which made a new mandate from the people necessary. Among them was the provision for a new loan to cover that. borrowed in the United States three years ago and which must be met by June 30th. He held that an early election was needed to give the authority necessary for raising such a loan.

Mr. Currie (Burin), was surprised to hear Mr. Cashin take this stand. It was only "throwing dust in the eyes of the people." The necessary arrangement no doubt, had already been made. The Minister had recently been in Canada and made the arrangements. The Canadian press had stated that he was there for that purpose. At any rate, the House was now in session and could pass the necessary legislation for raising this loan at once, without further authority from the people.
