Although well over 70 years of age, Mr. Lake retained his remarkable energy almost to the end and even whilst on his sick bed gave atantion to matters in connection with his business. And Mr. Lake's activities were not confined to business. To church and state he devoted a considerable portion of his time, taking a keen interest in matters pertaining to the welfare of the country and the town in which he resided. Fortune loses a good friend and ditizen in John E Lake.
