Boys Scouts in Camp at Mannels.

Sitting in one cozy canvas shelter with the cheerful rain-drops pattering on the roof, your camp scribe snatches a few minutes from the crowded hours of a filled-up day to send a few items of news concerning the Gower St. Boy Scouts to the readers of your esteemed family journal. The Camp opened on Monday at noon with 56 in attendance. This number has now increased to sixty, and more are expected in the course of the week. The first matter of importance after arrival was the preparation of dinner. This was served sharp on time at 12.30 o'clock, and the Camp machinery was fully running by the time of Tent Inspection at 2.30 o'clock the same afternoon. Our first meal consisted of roast beef, gravy and potatoes, bread and butter and tea. The meat was brought almost cooked from the city, and the campers have to thank a generous benefactor who keeps a warm heart in cold storage for emergencies like this, for the quarter of beef from which the roast was cut. The Newfoundland Atlantic Fisheries, Ltd., have also the hearty thanks of the Scouts for the first halibut sent by them which furnished the dinner today. The first fine day of Camp after two rainy ones, was very gladly welcomed by the boys, and they took full advantage of it to enjoy the swimming and to begin the series of football matches between the tents. The first game this afternoon between the "Curlews" in Tent One and the "Sea Gulls" in Tent Two, was won by the latter; score 1-0. The "Sea Gulls" again proved themselves stronger on the wing than the "Eagles" in Tent Three, even though the "Eagles" were assisted by the sturdy "Bull-dogs" and an inmate of the "Rovers" Tent. (The weather is rough and stormy, and the "Sea Gulls" appear to thrive on the wind and rain). Though the weather on the whole has been rather worse than better, the Scouts have used the time indoors to good advantage in working up for their tests for First Class Badges and other Scouting honors. The tents are being well looked after, and from the first day a strong rivalry developed among the Patrols in the contest for points and the possession of the coveted flag of honor. The flag went off Monday to the "Lions" with "Sea-Gulls" and "Seals" one point latitude; on Tuesday to the "Lions" again, and to-day the "Seals" captured it and nailed it to the ground to have and to hold until a better tent takes it from their custody. We have been favored already with the visits of a number of the friends and parents of the boys. The first to arrive was Mrs. George Houson, who brought with her another inmate of our little canvas city. To-day, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Forbes and daughter, and Mr. and Mrs. John Forbes, Mrs. Baggis and family, Mr. Fred Rose, Elie Clarke, Mrs. Dr. Roberts were welcome visitors in our midst.

Sir M. P. Cashin.—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of Hon. the Minister of Finance and Customs, to lay on the table of the House a statement showing the total Customs Revenue for the fiscal year which ended on Thursday last and for the two previous fiscal years.

Shipping Notes.

Schr. Hazel Trahey, 21 days from Barbados, arrived yesterday with molasses to Baine Johnstone & Co.

Adx. Schr. Haabet, 8 days from New York, reached port yesterday morning in ballast to Job Bros. and Co.

The Danish Schooner R. Fabricius sailed yesterday for Lisbon with 2051 quintals of codfish from Job Bros. and Co.

Schr. Frances Louise sailed yesterday for Ponce, Porto Rico, with 2731 qts. of codfish shipped by Job Bros. and Co.

Winter Ice Not Broken.

Reports received from Labrador are not altogether encouraging, particularly on the far northern end, where the winter ice has not yet broken up and up to a few days ago comatules were being used as far south as Holton. During the past three days very heavy gales have been experienced and this may have the effect of opening navigation. On the southern part of the coast there is good signs of fish, although around Flat Islands and vicinity there is still a lot of ice which interferes with fishing operations.

Railway Resolutions Expected.

It is expected that the Railway Resolutions will be considered by the House this afternoon in Committee of the Whole, in which case a lively session is likely to ensue. The Resolutions are governed by Sir George Bury's report and are tantamount to Reid control with a Government subsidy of \$1,500,000. It is understood that Sir John Croble will strenuously oppose the Resolutions and will place some startling facts before the House.

INTERNATIONAL TENNIS.

NEWPORT, R.I., July 7.
The Harvard-Yale tennis team defeated the Oxford-Cambridge team five matches to four by winning four of six singles matches played yesterday. The Englishmen took two of three doubles matches on Tuesday.

GREEKS SUFFER LOSS.

ANGORA, July 7.
An official communication issued yesterday by Turkish Nationalists announced the Greeks have suffered important losses in Izmiz section. Engagements in the region of Ushak are said to have resulted in the recapture of Greek advance posts.

BUSH FIRE THREATENS HAMLET.

OTTAWA, July 7.
Houses, barns and outbuildings of eight farms lying in the path of bush fires, raging around Maniwaki, have been razed. The fire has already reached the outskirts of Montfort, a hamlet of one thousand people, fifteen miles N.W. of Maniwaki. Fortunately there has been no loss of life. Stock too has thus far been saved. Should, however, the fire not abate within the next twenty-four hours, the village is declared to be doomed.

SELLING PRICE REDUCED.

NEW YORK, July 7.
U.S. Steel Corporation yesterday announced another cut, the second since April 12, in selling prices for finished products. "To correspond with existing prices of competitors." A number of smaller American companies recently announced reduction in prices.

SMUTS ON IRELAND.

LONDON, July 7.
The forces of conciliation led by General Smuts are spending every effort to find a solution for the Irish problem. Sinn Fein and Unionist leaders from South Ireland will meet in Dublin to-morrow, and it is possible that some statement of the British Government's position will be submitted at this conference. General Smuts in an address delivered last night declared the Irish problem could be solved, and pointed out that the position in Ireland was similar to that which existed in South Africa when the Republican movement was strong in that dominion. He said that since the Union of South Africa had decided to remain linked with the Empire, the people had benefited from "their forbearance and self-sacrifice."

To Take Cargo.

The United States Shipping Board steamer Bannock, 5 days from New York, arrived in port this morning and hauled to Shea & Co's pier where she will take on board the discharged portion of the Charlott's cargo. The latter ship has been hauled alongside and that part of the cargo not discharged will also be transferred.
