Our Dumb Animals

WEEK ENDING JUNE 27th.

Attended to the landing of cattle and sheep from the Sable I. All in good condition, and taken away to pasture. Also attended to the different sales of cattle, horses, pigs and poultry at the Abattoir Co's. Everything was looked after satisfactorily. I humbly put to death a horse for Steer Bros. which was suffering with lock jaw. Also shot a dog, owned by Mr. Carnell, Freshwater, which had bitten a boy on Cookstown Road. I destroyed another at Sergeant O'Keeffe's request, which had bitten a boy named Sharpe on Lower Street and another one for a resident of Queen's Square, which had also bitten a boy. I also shot a dog for a resident of Queen's Road, who promised to contribute towards the funds of the Society. Was asked by the Secretary of the Municipal Council to hunt up four dogs, which had destroyed four sheep valued at \$70.00, on Hamilton St. At 4 o'clock, accompanied by Mr. Moore and Redmond and son, who had watched the dogs destroy the sheep, and who identified them, I found three of the dogs

acting under instructions. I humanely put them to death. Dogs in this locality are around the city and have become a terrible pest. Quite a number of hens on Cahok Street and Cornwall Avenue have been destroyed. I went to visit a number of delinquent boys who have been annoying horses and cattle. Things are improving in this respect. Put to death

a large ox for Mr. Blackler, butcher, New Gower Street, who was so well pleased, that he has ordered a humane killer. These horses have been sent off the street for treatment. Received word that boys have been driving horses too fast when loading them to pasture. (This owner will put a stop to it. A number of complaints have been received concerning de-

Medical School Inspection

It would certainly appear that an investigation should be held into the medical inspection of schools, which is charged with inefficiency and insufficiency. Answering these charges, Dr. Gage-

non, superintendent of the Child Welfare Branch of the Health Department, says that more adequate inspection would be secured if the staff of inspectors was enlarged, and that the sum of fifteen thousand dollars should be set aside by the city towards this end. Even the Medical Health Officer of the city, Dr. Boucher, holds that the staff is undermanned; at the same time he does not admit that

there is any incompetency among the present inspectors.

The whole situation is unsatisfactory. Here is the metropolitan city of the Dominion, with an annual revenue of twenty-seven millions, possessing such an inadequate staff of medical school inspectors and nurses that scholars are not receiving satisfactory attention.—Montreal Star.
