An EASTERN CAP

Negotiation for Reunion OF THE CHURCHES SUSPENDED.

BIG ADVANCE TROUGH VIRTUAL AGREEMENT ON MATTERS OF FAITH, BUT DISAGREEMENT ON THE QUESTION OF THE REORDINATION OF FREE CHURCH MINISTERS.

The Committee of the Council of the Free Churches, which has been discussing the questions of re-union with the Church of England, based on the appeal made four years ago at the Lambeth Conference, has decided to suspend its sittings. Although considerable advance has been made, as both sides agree, the question of the reordination of ministers of the Free Churches, which is considered essential on the one side, cannot be accepted by the representatives of the Free Churches.

Speaking at Heaton Mersey recently, the Rev. Dr. J. D. Jones, one of the leading representatives of the Free Churches, in a speech recorded in the Manchester Guardian, said:—

Agreement on Matters of Faith.—“In matters of faith the Re-union Conference has discovered that there was little difference between them. There was, in fact, sufficient agreement to justify them in working together in many ways. There was also a considerable measure of agreement in other things. It was recognized that Free Church ministers were true ministers of the Word and of the Sacraments in the Holy Catholic Church. That was the biggest admission since the Reformation.

“The logical consequence was that they were able to minister in one another's pulpits, and during the last nine months he had preached in the cathedrals of Canterbury, Liverpool, and Hereford. He did not say that would be general yet awhile, for the bishops laid down certain other conditions, but the interchange of pulpits represented a tremendous change in the relationships of the Churches as compared with twenty years ago.”

“The Free Church Council, it is worth observing, seems to accept the conclusions of the Lambeth Committee on the supposition that all three elements of Church order—Bishop, presbyter, and people—are to be given their due weight. If the acceptance of this standpoint demanded real liberty of view on the part of Free Church leaders, as it plainly did, the other burning question tested the statesmanship of the Anglican representatives,” says the Times.

A Fine Liberty of View.—“Granted that there were to be

Bishops in the reunited Church, what line was to be taken touching those in the Free Churches who are perfectly content with the credentials of the ministry they are at present so fruitfully exercising? It is to the credit of those who spoke for the Church of England that they showed themselves capable of no less liberality of view than their friends on the other side. The Free Church Council is able to point to a striking statement made by the Anglican representatives.

“Basing their opinion on the appeal of the Lambeth Conference of 1920, they lay it down that ministries which imply a sincere intention to preach Christ's Word and administer the Sacraments as Christ has ordained, and to which authority so to do has been solemnly given, are real ministries in the Universal Church. The Free Church conclusion that this statement removes any necessity for the re-ordination of such ministers, even sub conditions, seems to the ordinary observer one that is obvious and natural and indeed even irresistible.

“The point that has been reached has been the result of prolonged and intimate discussion on the part of men of outstanding ability and intelligence. It is a point for which, unfortunately, the rank and file in all the Churches are by no means as yet prepared. The arguments that have convinced those who met at Lambeth need stating and explaining and reiterating in every town and village, in every church and chapel in the country.

A Plea For A Great Campaign.—“A great campaign of enlightenment is wanted. Time presses; the days in which we live are not ordinary. The forces of disruption and destruction are active. The power of construction, of co-operation, of the ingeneration of reason and of a right view of human relationships that would spring from a united Christianity within our land is enormous.”

“Each side has made its advance. The Free Churchmen have agreed that in the United Church of the future there must be a constitutional episcopacy, place being given to elements of Presbyterian and Congregational order. The Anglicans on their side have admitted that the ministries of the Free Churches, where certain conditions are fulfilled, are ‘real ministries of Christ's Word and Sacraments,’ comments the Sunday Times.

“Both the Free Church and the Anglican leaders have travelled bravely forward, now they look round, and to their dismay find they have not been followed. The strong Churchman, or Free Churchman, is not ready to give a blank cheque to his leaders. He talks

darkly of his fear lest they sell the pass. That is why these leaders, recording the mark which they had own followers.”

Blaming The Anglo-Catholics.

“How can we explain this lamentable result, this melancholy climax to so many eager hopes and earnest prayers?” asks the British Weekly. “It has come about through powerful partisan forces, working to some extent out of sight. Millions of Christian hearts thrilled in response to the Lambeth Appeal, because that Appeal was not afraid to put first things first. It laid emphasis on spiritual rather than on ecclesiastical values.

“The Church of England, however, includes a large and influential section who sincerely believe otherwise. And within that Church itself much has happened since the Lambeth Conference. As soon as they saw the possibility of home reunion the Anglo-Catholics took alarm. During these last five years they have done their utmost to prevent its accomplishment.

“They muttered threats of instant secession if any minister untouched by episcopal hands were suffered to take part in conducting an Anglican Communion service. Their claims and their practices within the Church of England have risen rapidly to a high pitch which, we venture to say, the bishops assembled at Lambeth hardly dreamed of.

“This Anglo-Catholic party—aggressive, arrogant, intolerant, contemptuous of every bishop who tries to curb its extravagances—can now take to its credit, or discredit, that it has postponed home reunion indefinitely, and at any rate for a generation.”

Must Function as a Separate Unit

United Church of Manitoba Decided to Stand Alone in Religious Council

Winnipeg, Oct. 22.—Following a heated debate, the Manitoba conference of the United Church here today passed a resolution calling upon the United Church to function “as a unit” in the religious education council of Manitoba. So strong was the opposition voiced by several of the delegates that a serious cleavage was threatened.

Sir James Aikens, Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, supported by a number of other delegates, questioned the right of the conference to determine this point. It was contended by the opposition that the provincial conference would be establishing a dangerous precedent in committing itself to any programme over the policies of which it had no control.

Canada's Thirst Increases

London, Oct. 21.—Whiskey shipments to Canada are on the increase, according to the figures published recently in Harper's Wine and Spirit Gazette, but less liquor is being drunk in England as a whole. In the report trade during August there was an increase of 66,450 gallons of whiskey in shipments to Canada, although this was more than counter balanced by a sum of 74,445 gallons in shipments to Germany.

The report figures for the eight months of 1923 were 4,686,201 gallons and for the corresponding period in 1924 and 1925 were 5,455,923 and 5,012,423 gallons respectively.

According to the estimate of the Gazette, the present whiskey consumption in the United Kingdom is little more than 11,000,000 proof gallons, which is less than a third of the amount consumed twenty-one years ago.

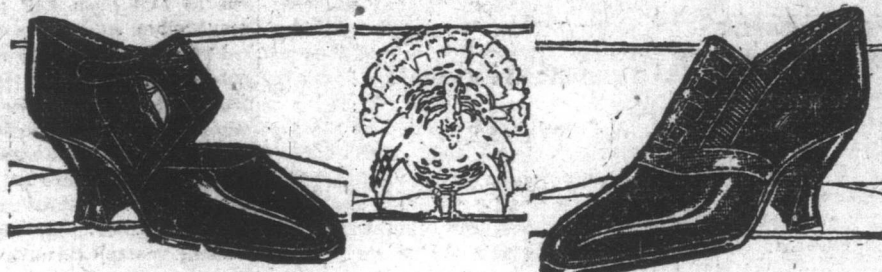

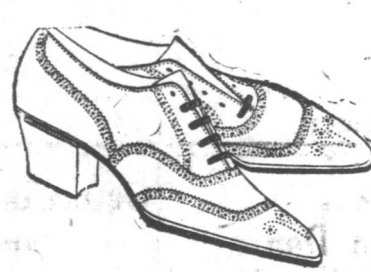

Devil's Food Cake

1½ cup Crisco 2 eggs beaten separately
2 cups sugar 2½ cups flour
2 sq. chocolate, in 1 cup ½ cup sour milk
boiling water; let
simmer two minutes. ½ teaspoon salt

Cream Crisco thoroughly. Add sugar gradually. Add egg yolks beaten thick and lemon colored. Beat well. Add a little flour, then chocolate and water alternately with rest of flour. Add sour milk, and soda. Fold in whites of eggs. Bake in moderate oven for forty-five minutes.

Icing

1 cup sugar 1-3 cup of water
Boil to soft ball. Pour one-third syrup over two well-beaten egg whites. Continue beating while remainder cooks until it spins a thread. Add to egg mixture. Add one teaspoon vanilla. Spread over cake, when cool.
