

ALL PARIS MISSES THE PRINCE OF WALES

Was Very Popular Among the French Tradesmen With Whom He Dealt

He is Described as a Charming Young Man and Not a Bit Proud

Woman Who Helped to Defraud Man of \$500 is Shot and Mortally Wounded

Paris, Aug. 21.—All Paris misses the Prince of Wales and especially the humble folk of the quarter in which he lived. Every day the shopkeepers of the Rue de Valenciennes on the alert for a glimpse of the Prince. The cooler whose trade kept him at the window was the most fortunate. "I saw him every day," he says with justifiable pride. "Every time he came out he passed my shop, and let me tell you he never failed to give me a glance at it. He was a charming young man and not a bit proud. One day a little girl saw it with my own eyes—ran into him as she was playing. The Prince held her to keep her from falling and kissed her so pleasantly if she had but heard!"

Still more precise are the impressions of the news agent at the corner of the Rue de Valenciennes and the Grande Arme, for the Prince used often to buy picture postcards from her shop. When the Prince came to live in Paris she purchased English stationery in the hope that she would some day be honored by Royal patronage. Honored she was, but in her own words, "The Prince seemed to take no interest in the English goods I displayed. He bought French Illustrated cards, which he cherished. I could see him smile with pleasure whenever he found a card which represented some historic moment he had just visited. Every time he came to my shop he bought picture postcards, every street in Paris must have been represented among his purchases." Then the good lady told with pride a more personal incident—how one day the Prince, in pulling a marble from a sack, had brought down several others; how she had run forward to pick them up, and how her Royal customer had exclaimed heartily, "Si gentilment!" "He was charming, and not a bit proud," she ended, and that is the verdict of all.

He also alleges that she had proposed to someone in his possession to show that he was a member of the society, and he carefully preserved the names of some of its members.
