LONDON AND PRECINCTS.

Mr. James Cole, of Brussels, has been visiting friends in this city.

A correspondent says the fall wheat in the vicinity of Byron is splendid, considering the bad weather.

This is the time of the year when the fat boy is selected by his companions as the proper person to venture upon the ice to see if it will bear.

Two bilious individuals had an audience with Magistrate Parke this morning. It cost one of them \$2 or twenty days and the other was allowed to go.

London Typographical Union sent a letter of condolence to Mrs. H. D. Lee, of Fort William, on the death of her husband, who was formerly president of that union.

Little Minnie Rogers, about 8 years old, who was charged with vagrancy at the Police Court this morning, was taken home by her father and the charge was dismissed.

Mr. James Darter, the popular M. C. R. station master at Ridgetown, was in the city yesterday looking well and as large as ever. Mr. Darter is a former London boy, and his old friends could not help remarking that his bright smile haunts him still.

The organ recital and sacred concert in the Congregational Church, which was announced for Feb. 10, but was unavoidably postponed, will take place this evening. An excellent programme has been arranged for, and some very fine talent engaged for the occasion.

Rev. Leonard Gaetz, formerly of this city, said in a lecture delivered in Hamilton, recently, on the great Northwest: "There are scarcely any annexationists there, and an investment of a few hundred dollars will produce more results there in five years than in fifteen years in Ontario."

This year's assessment of No. 3 ward shows an increase in the value of real property of \$11,400, but there is a slight falling off in personal and taxable income. The total assessed value of realty, personalty and income is \$1,937,267 this year, as compared with \$1,933,467 last year, an increase of \$3,800. The population of the ward has increased by 115 since last year.

The American Musician, of New York, speaks as follows of Miss Strauss, who is to appear at the London Symphony Concert on April 11: "Miss Adele Strauss is undoubtedly a powerful mezzo-soprano voice. She sang her several numbers with an evident comprehension of their musical import; her delivery is sure and easy, her diction clear; she has feeling and warmth of accent—qualities which are enhanced by great facility in vocalization."

A Fort Grafton correspondent of the Port Huron Times says: "A great many persons have been making inquiry why George Jackson selected March 17 for opening his new hotel and upon inquiry from him he assigns the following: He had been anxious for some time to determine his nationality, so he wrote to London, Ont., for his grand-mother's family record Bible, which he pondered over for three days and nights, securing evidence satisfactory to him, that he was in direct line of lineal descent of that patron saint, St. Patrick, and the selection of that date was eminently proper."

Who'd-a-Get Him.
Either a crank or a knave has written to the Board of Public Works and to the News as to cleaning the city streets. He signs himself as Silas Straight, of London, Ont. His letter to the Board of Works states that he will be a bidder for the public cleaning contract, and will whack up with the individual members of the Board if they give him the contract. The letter to the News offers \$5,000 for influence which will secure the contract. A telegram to London asking who this fool was brought back an answer that no such man was known there, and that his name was not in the directory.

London Workmen at Woodstock.
The second of what is intended to be a series of meetings in the interests of the laboring men of the town was held in Hardy's Hall last night. There was a much larger attendance present than on the previous occasion. District Master Workman Marks, of London, was present, and addressed the assembly on "Nationalism." He quoted largely from Edward Bellamy's book, "Looking Backward," to show the improvement that would come to

the working classes if such changes as are described in it should eventually happen. Several other gentlemen present spoke on the advantages of organization. One speaker took exception to the paragraph going the rounds of the press under the caption of "Tyranny of Labor," and contended that, while labor is described as tyrannical, there has been evidently no effort made to discover the reason for the position that the men take when demanding the discharge of an obnoxious manager. Another meeting will be held two weeks from last night, when Jos. Brent, of London, president of the Trades and Labor Council, will speak on the same subject. [Woodstock Sentinel-Review.]

THE COURTS.

Assizes at St. Thomas—An Empty Jail—Civil Cases.

ST. THOMAS, March 18.—Justice Street presided at the opening of the Elgin Spring Assizes. There were no prisoners in jail.

Kelly vs. Heard & Co., a suit to recover damages for loss of a hand at defendant's factory, was settled, plaintiff being paid \$350, including costs.

Johnston vs. Hamilton.—Action brought by members of the firm of Paul Weidmann & Co., of Weidmann, against James Hamilton, pump manufacturer, of Alvinston, for damages for false and malicious arrest. The affair rose out of a dispute as to the ownership of a pump on the premises of a former resident of Weidmann, who had absconded. Case still on.

Kelly vs. Forby.—Action to recover possession of lumber and damages for unlawful detention. Plaintiff is a dealer in ties and staves, residing at Aylmer, and the defendant is manager of a sawmill near this place. Plaintiff brought to the court the quantity of ties to be sawn into ties. A dispute arose as to the rate at which the work should be done. Defendant, after a certain number of ties had been removed without payment being made for the work, although promised, refused to allow any more to be removed until paid in full. The plaintiff tendered \$81 as the full amount of the account, which was denied. Judgment in favor of defendant for \$130 and costs.

Woolvs vs. Western Bank.—Action brought by a farmer living near Springfield to recover from the Western Bank \$300 of insurance assigned to the bank by a warehouseman named Kirkland, and which the plaintiff claimed was effected on wheat belonging to him stored in Kirkland's warehouse, and which was destroyed by fire. For the defense it was contended that the wheat really belonged to Kirkland, who was the bank's debtor at the time of the fire and the making of the assignment. Judgment for plaintiff for \$270.

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill against Wm. Reischberg charged with forgery.

There is a suit, an action arising out of a mistake in the drawing of a conveyance, was decided in favor of the plaintiff.

UNCLE SAM'S TARIFF.

Features of the Bill Prepared by the Ways and Means Committee.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The internal revenue features of the tariff schedules agreed upon by the Republican members of the House Ways and Means Committee are: Abolition of all special taxes upon dealers of all kinds known as licensees. The tax upon snuff will be repealed. Farmers and planters growing tobacco may sell to whom they please without restraint. The tax upon manufactured tobacco will be reduced to 8 to 10 cents a pound. Cigars, cheroots and cigarettes will carry the same tax as under the present law. Alcohol used in the arts is free under substantially the same restrictions in the duties upon spirits. The reduction in the revenue from these sources will be between \$17,000,000 and \$19,000,000.

In the lumber schedule the duty on sawed lumber, planed and finished lumber is reduced 50 per cent. from the present rate. There is a special provision that if Canada lays an export duty upon lumber duties shall be collected according to existing rates.

There is an increase generally along the entire list in the duties upon agricultural products. The duty on barley is raised to 40 cents a bushel; hops to 15 cents a pound; buckwheat to 15 cents a bushel; oats, 10 cents a bushel. The duty on agricultural seeds is increased. Butter and substitutes therefore have the duty increased to 6 cents a pound. The duty on eggs is made 5 cents a dozen. Potatoes will pay 25 cents a bushel. Hides, now on the free list, are made dutiable at 14 cents a pound.

There is a small increase in the duties upon fruits. Salt has not been touched. Among the new provisions in the bill is one that no importations shall be made into the United States which do not show plainly the country from which they are imported. The bill repeals the law which gives the right to import supplies free of duty. The free list, which contains, with a few exceptions, all the terms in the Senate bill and a few others not in the Senate bill, it is estimated make a reduction of between \$1,250,000 and \$1,500,000. The revisions made through the tariff schedules are expected to effect a reduction of about \$15,000,000. The total reduction made by the bill is estimated at \$300,000,000.

NEWS IN A LINE.

The English War Office is experimenting with the lance as a cavalry arm.

A restaurant at Hamburg is said to be built and furnished entirely of paper.

The Pigott letters have now gone back into the possession of the London Times.

The perfect figure of a human body has been found in a large elm tree trunk that was being cut up in a timber yard at Scarborough.

French wine-growers have a suspicious appreciation of comets, and expect good crops because four comets will be seen during the summer.

It is officially declared that there is salt enough in the Teseide field in England to supply the world for 800 years. One less worry for the present generation.

Search for diamonds is being made by the French Government at the penal colony of New California. Machinery to bore down 1,500 feet has been provided.

The fields which are said to promise vast returns have been opened at Gippsland, in the colony of Australia, and an English company has been formed to work them.

The southern district of London is being harried by burglars, and it is estimated that \$25,000 worth of property has been stolen in a territory covering about three square miles.

An almost complete score of Wagner's "Tannhauser," written by Richard Wagner, and signed by him, has been discovered in the ruins of the Zurich Theater recently burned.
