AUSTRIA'S POSITION.

An Armistice Is Assured.

Turkey Will Accede to the Request of Greece.

Opinions of the Greek Press in Regard to Mediation—A Demoralized Army.

London, May 13.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "I ascertained at the Italian Foreign Office that Turkey will certainly accede to the request for an armistice and will place herself in the hands of the powers. The general condition of indemnity and a strategic rectification of frontier, upon which Turkey insists, have been already acquiesced in by the powers. It is probable that the powers will land additional troops in Crete."

It is officially announced in Athens that the power have notified the Greek Government that the Greek troops may leave the island of Crete, and that the admirals will release the prisoners which have been seized during the blockade.

The Athens Asy approves of the decision of the Government to accept mediation, and urges upon the powers which help to aggravate the situation of the Greek Government. The Asy also asserts that the decision of the powers should be respected, and discusses the chance of an honorable peace.

The Greek Army Demoralized.

London, May 13.—Mailed dispatches from the English reporters continue to unfold the story of demoralization and neglect in the Greek army. The correspondent of the Daily Mail, writing from Art, relates that the Sixth Regiment, when at Philippopolis, received at an early hour in the morning bread and water for the breakfast of its men. Afterward the regiment marched by easy stages to the neighborhood of Pentepoli, arriving at 6 o'clock in the evening. No provisions of any kind arrived that night. Next morning the men had nothing to eat, but they were ordered to march back to Philippopolis. The poor fellows began the retreat, but many were unable to keep in the ranks, and the roadsides were littered with the bodies of the men who had succumbed to hunger and fatigue. The Turks, who were only a few miles behind, were a greater benefit than that, possibly twice as much.

Mr. Roche, one of Manitoba's two Conservatives, spoke in favor of free agricultural implements.

"SAUCE FOR THE GANDER."

Berlin, May 13.—In the German Reichstag Herr Bebel opened the discussion on the motion of Herr Auer, Socialist, to repeal the clause of the penal code dealing with less majesty.

Herr Bebel declared that the majority of the prosecutions on the charge of less majesty were the work of informers to complete the family by private vengeance. He reminded the House of the various expressions used by Emperor William, notably his reference to his Brandenburg speech of February last, to "a pack of fellows," and the words "men without patriotism," alleged to have been used by his Majesty in a dispatch to his brother, Prince Henry of Prussia. Such utterances, Herr Bebel asserted, were calculated to undermine the good name of German people.

The President of the Reichstag at this stage of the debate called upon Herr Bebel not to draw the name of the head of the state into the discussion, and under no circumstances to use offensive language. In conclusion, Herr Bebel remarked that in cases of less majesty the person in referred should be prosecuted. The Reichstag then adjourned.

CABLE NOTES.

It is learned that the Allan Steamship Co. is again approaching the Government, with a view to enabling them to compete for the fast mail service on terms more nearly approaching those of the Petersons' offer.

An appeal, signed by the lord mayor of Dublin, John Redmond, M.P., and other influential friends of the late Charles Stewart Parnell, has been issued in behalf of donations to a fund to assist Mrs. Della Parnell, mother of the great Irish leader, and other needy members of the family, by freeing the Parnell estates at Avondale from debt and other obligations.

Did Mr. A. F. Davin Really Crawl Under the Barn?

Ottawa, May 13.—Mr. McCleary, of Welland, had a long string of questions on the order paper yesterday regarding dismissals on the Welland Canal.

Hon. Mr. Blair, in reply, said the men in question had been dismissed, but had simply not been re-engaged this season. He added these stinging words: "It may be true that on one or more of the canals a practice had grown up of buying and selling the places of lock masters and bridge tenders, and many persons, having bought these places from those who had influence with the late Government, or with members of Parliament, might have come to consider that they had thereby acquired a permanent employment; but inasmuch as no portion of the purchase price passed into the hands of the Government, a transaction could not be regarded as conferring any such right upon the employee. Of 170 men on the Welland Canal only 10 have not been re-employed this year."

Mr. Davin made material for another row in the House yesterday afternoon. He complained that he had not been properly treated, and was not given an opportunity to divide the House the previous day.

The Premier said he would be glad to give Mr. Davin an opportunity to present his motion to free agricultural implements from duty as some other time.

A few minutes later, when the orders of the day were called, Mr. Davin moved that good faith with the western farmer on the part of the Government demands that agricultural implements and lumber be placed on the free list.

Mr. Douglas refused to support the motion on the ground that the farmers wished no special favors. He hinted that the motion was a trick, as indeed it was.

Mr. Rogers said the men behind the motion were not the true lovers of the farmer, and as a patron he could not follow them.

Col. Donville, who, like the members generally, has become very tired of the daily deluge of Mr. Davin, suggested that members who
