London, Sept. 8 .- The terms of the Anglo-German agreement are stated, upon good authority, to be, in the main, as follows:

The first point is that Germany and England have come to a complete understanding on all African questions. In February, 1895, Germany made a formal claim upon Lord Kimberley, then British foreign secretary for the maintenance of the status quo in control. Germany now withdraws absolutely from the claim, and leaves Great Britain a completely free hand in South Africa.

The German and British ministers further agree to give a joint government guarantee of a loan to Portugal to enable her to meet the award of the Swiss arbitrators regarding the Delagoa Railway. Arbitration is to decide the amount of compensation due by the Portugese Government to the McMurdo concessionaries of the Dela-Stearns wheels to rent: afternoon or evening, 35c: tandems, 75c. Precedence, Systematic Beneficence and Other Matters Discussed by the Methodist General

General Conference yesterday two important reports were submitted. One

was from the committee on memorials,

and the other from the committee on systematic beneficence. The report of the memorial committee urged the General Conference to direct its special committee to proceed with all diligence toward obtaining the co-operation of other churches in the proposed memorializing of her Majesty's government to remove the order of precedence from the clergy in state functions in Canada, which is, the committee submitted, offensive in its unjust discrimination, and is utterly opposed to the constitutional relations of church and state in this Dominion.

The clause was adopted. The conference also approved of the clause that to prohibit ministers and other members of the church from becoming members of the Freemasons and other similar societies would be an undue interference with Christian lib-

Conference also agreed with the committee's announcement in regard to the admission of women to the church councils. They had no reason, they said, for believing that there were any considerable number of women in the Methodist Church who desired the change proposed, and it was therefore recommended that no action be taken. A long discussion took place on the clause on the report of the commit-tee on systematic beneficence, urging the conference to adopt the principle of giving of tithes. Finally the clause was referred back, with instructions of the committee to make it recommendatory and not legislative.
