DEATH OF MRS. SIMPSON.
Mrs. Jessie Simpson, of 32 Hope street, died last evening, aged 82 years. Two daughters survive—Mrs. Jessie Simpson, of the Princess Avenue school staff, and Mrs. Alex. Ferguson, city. Mrs. Brent's Funeral

A Large Gathering—Mrs. Robinson's Address.

The late Mrs. Joseph Brent was a prominent spiritualist in the city, and her funeral services held yesterday were conducted by Mrs. Anna L. Robinson, pastor of the Spiritual Church, Port Huron.

Decidedly deceased was greatly beloved in the community, and her sorrowing friends thronged the funeral residence, 63 Maitland street, to bid a sad farewell to her mortal remains. The only son, Charles, of Michigan City, was present.

Most of the spiritualists in the city were also in attendance. The service, which began at 2:30 p.m., was very simple, and did not differ much from that of other denominations. The Cooking Glass.

An Evening With Miss Fraser at the "Y" Rooms.

A Model Kitchen—Recipes of Some Savory Dishes.

The classes in cookery in connection with the Young Women's Christian Temperance Union conducted by Miss Annie Fraser, of Bowmanville, a graduate of the Toronto School of Cookery, although well attended, might be more freely taken advantage of. Monday evening a demonstration lesson was given by the professional cook, assisted by Miss Loughrey. A newspaper man called at the "Y" rooms and was ushered into the "kitchen." It was a model one. On the table was the usual supply of bowls and dishes, butter and eggs, and the hundred and one domestic implements that puzzle the masculine mind. There were utensils of almost every size and shape, and into these were turned those exquisite dishes that only a first-class cook can prepare, which are very digestible, which help to produce that ruddy, healthy complexion, the outward or visible sign of good cooking and an appetite to match. There the good housewife might easily learn to abandon her ancient ideas of classic dough-nuts, which would stretch a foot before breaking, and take up a new idea. In this school samples of the various sorts are seen, but none of these require the assistance of an axe and a hot cup of tea to prepare them for mastication. The jellies and preserves they make are dishes fully satisfying to the palate, and they are prepared with their method of preparation, and never work the top off the jar in an effort to escape or grow sour from the effect of the sunlight. Nothing indigestible is over thought of. The landlady with a household of boarders quailed when she heard "Wash the currants thoroughly, and add three pounds of stoned raisins. Would the boarders ever stop feeding if such dishes were prepared?" "Boeuf a la mode et pommede terre de la Reine!" never contained any more "a la" than was necessary. It did not affect the dish only in name, but when the dish was produced the name was only a fitting one for it. Monday night Miss Fraser was most attentive, and paid particular attention to every little detail. The following dishes were prepared and tried by the ladies present:

PEA FRITTERS.
One pint of green peas. Mash thoroughly through a sieve while hot; add half teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper, and one tablespoonful of butter. After allowing to cool, add a beaten egg, one cup of milk, one cup of sifted flour, and one teaspoonful of baking powder. Stir the batter, which will be about the same consistency as that for pancakes, thoroughly and place in a hot pan and fry in plenty of butter. Serve hot.

POTATO PUFFS.
Take two cups of mashed potatoes; add a tablespoonful of butter and beat to a cream. Pour in half a cup of milk and the yolks of two eggs, well beaten together, into which has been put sufficient salt to suit the taste. After this gently stir in the white of the two eggs, which have been beaten stiffly. (Do not beat it in the same consistency as that for pancakes, thoroughly and place in a hot pan and fry in plenty of butter. Serve hot.

POTATOES AU GRATIN.
The recipe for this excellent dish is the same as the preceding one. After the sauce has been poured on and the potatoes well mixed, grate cheese over the whole sufficient to cover it nicely, and then bake in oven.

BAKED CELERY.
Cut two bunches of celery fine and stew in salt water; when cooked strain off water and add a sauce made as follows: Put in a pan one cup of butter, one cup of milk, one cup of cream, one cup of sugar, one cup of flour, one cup of salt, and one cup of pepper. Stir the mixture until it is thick, then add the celery and bake in oven.
