London, April 2.- The rumors of the recapture by the British of the seven guns taken from Col. Broadwood's force, based on a dispatch to the Chronicle from Bloemfontein, which is said, in all probability, to be correct, tends to compensate the London shock experienced from the disaster sustained within a few miles from the headquarters of the British army of occupation. President Kruger is said to have promised to reoccupy Bloemfontein this week, and the stubborn burghers seem to be closing around the place in menacing force. The ac-tivity of a strong Boer force in the vicinity of Paardeberg has already in-tercepted direct communication between Lord Roberts and Kimberley. The nation is beginning to realize, from the nature of the guerilla warfare that it is liable to embarrass the future movements of the British

INCIDENTS OF SPLENDID HERO-

A special dispatch from Bloemfontein dated today, says: The loss of the guns was attended by incidents of splendid heroism. The leading battery was so near to the Boers ambushed in the rived bed, that the latter said: "It is useless your attempting to advance; throw down your arms."

The sergeant of the battery, fearing the other battery would misunderstand the hindrance, rushed through the convoy and warned his commanders, enabling the rearmost battery to save a portion of the guns, which came into action later. The Life Guardsmen and a gunner got a gun out under a tremendous fire, and four others were saved by the men dragging them off In the case of Major Stone, who had the local rank of lieutenant-colonel, after their horses had been shot.

London, April 2-4:55 p.m.-The war office has received another dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated Bloemfontein, Sunday, April 1, 8:15 p.m., in which, after referring to his previous telegram, he gives a partial list of the missing British officers. Of Q battery four officers were wounded, two of whom are missing. One gunner was killed and 40 non-commissioned officers and men are wounded or missing. Lord Roberts then continues:

In U battery all are missing except Major Taylor and a sergeant-major. The two cavalry regiments did not suffer much.

A report has just come in that the enemy has retired towards Ladybrand, leaving 12 wounded officers and some 70 men at the waterworks. We are now sending an ambulance for them.'

Britain's Phenomenal Prosperity-The Queen's Visit to Ireland Stirs Great Enthusiasm.

DUBLIN EN FETE. New York, 'April 2 .- "Bedad, and it's mad you're all agoing, I'll be think-ing," said an old six-foot Irishman, walking in College Green yesterday af-

ternoon, says a Dublin cable to the Herald. Indeed, Old Dublin, as it has been tovingly called, is bristling with excitement and bright with thousands upon thousands of fluttering flags. What strikes one, when the people are out in thousands, as a sure sign that her majesty's passage will arouse enor-mous enthusiasm, is the unmistakable evidence in the streets that Irish women have taken up the loyal cry. With scarcely any exceptions all were wearing red, white and blue ribbons and patriotic badges, with little pictures in them of the Queen, Lord Roberts, Lord Kitchener and Col. Baden-Powell, and others, and if the women are thus inclined, the men are sure to follow.

It is evident that the Irishman is go-

ing to accept this occasion as giving to the Englishman, while deeply impressed by his deeds recently in the field, a better knowledge of the Irish-man at home. The Irish car-driver in Dublin is always a man from whom you may be sure of drawing a reply clothed in candor, reflecting the ideas of the mon in the street. This afternoon one was asked, "Will there be any disturbance? He replied: "Faith, and what would

that serve? Again: "Is the Queen's visit popu-

He replied: "Certainly, but if it was made oftenerit would be more popular."
The Duke of Connaught, who really loves the Irish, has done much to pave the way toward that reconciliation so much wished for by the English, and so ardently hoped for by all except professional agitators and insatiable malcontents.

THE SOUTH POLE.

London, April 2.-Carsten E. Borchgrevink, the leader of the south polar expedition fitted out in 1898 by Sir George Newnes, of this city, who, with the surviving members of his party, arrived yesterday on the steamer Southern Cross, at Campbelltown, near Bluff Harbor, N. Z., telegraphs to Sir George Newnes that the object of the expedi-tion had been fully attained. The position of the south magnetic pole has been located. The expedition reached the further point south with a sledge of which there is any record, namely, latitude 78 degrees, 50 minutes south. Previous to the late exploration Herr Borchgrevink believed the south mag-netic pole to be situated in latitude 57 degrees, 5 minutes south, and longitude 15 degrees east.

· WITH THE BRITISH. Yokohama, March 14, via San Francisco, April 1.—The emperor's message of congratulation to Queen Victoria and the reply thereto, have awakened lively sensation in all quarters of the empire and have emphasized the sympathy almost universally felt for British in the South African

struggle. It is reported that the emperor will shortly raise to the peerage Dr. Kentaro Kaneko, the first of the Japanese to be granted the honorary degree of LL.D. by Harvard University. He is well known in New Washington.

Judging from the strictures of the native press, there is fear of some friction between Japan and the United States on the Hawaiian question. There are now some 60,000 Japanese subjects on the islands. It is claimed the United States ignored the pledges given to the Japanese Government at the time of annexathion.

BRITAIN IS PROSPEROUS. London, April 2.-The annual statement of the chancellor of the ex chequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, for the year ending March 31, shows a net increase over 1899 of £11,899,377, of which £7,462,801 occurred in the last quarter and was evidently due to the immense payments for the release of bonded goods previous to the budget announcement.
