BASEBALL

TAKE AND GIVE.

Large crowds attended the London-Toronto ball game at Tecumseh Park yesterday, in spite of the many counter attractions, and witnessed two fast exhibitions. The paid admission at both games totalled 2,500. In the morning game the home team landed on Pitcher Owens in the first inning, and batted out two runs. The visit seemed to lack ginger, but when their manager hove in sight, and delivered a few terse remarks, the Detroiters woke up, and played a beautiful game. The general impression that the visitors left behind them is that American league ball is none too fast for Pete Lohman's braves, and that the local boys would make good showing in a big league. Frisk, the ex-Canadian League pitcher, went in in the ninth to bat for Owen, and to try to pull the game out of the hole, but he proved no better than his retired partner. The far-famed Casey was at third, and was kept busy. He robbed the home team of several hard drives that looked good for two bases. The two runs in the first inning were scored on Charlie Jones' long drive between left and center. Radcliffe drew a pass, and was forced out by Mohler, who stole second. Hemphill went to first on a pass, and Hart popped to the infield. Jones followed with his hard drive, and Mohler and Hemphill crossed the plate. Elberfeld, shortstop for Detroit, is the fastest man at that position seen in a long time in London. His work of getting after grounders and dropping them to first was great. In the sixth, London again added two tallies. Jones was thrown out by Elberfeld. Reed sent a beautiful drive to center and Cope singled. Owen tried to catch Reed at second, but big Bill was there, and the ball struck him on the shoulder, and rolled out in the field, and the runner went to third. Lohman flew out to left, and Reed came home on the

throw. Thompson, who had fanned twice, sent the ball to center for a double, scoring Cope. The home team played fast and clean ball, and to this fact alone was due the win, as in the ninth things were decidedly exciting. A clean drive would have meant disaster for the locals. Nichol had scored, and there were two on bases, and McAllister was to bat. He is considered one of the best hitters in the team, but failed to hit safely. The score:
