STREETS GAY WITH BUNTING

Beautiful Decorations in Honor of the Royal Visitors.

Public Buildings and Private Residences Adorned With Vari-Colored Flags.

When the duke and duchess drove through the city streets today their eyes rested everywhere upon the decorations which had been erected in their honor. The citizens responded liberally to the appeals of the civic committee, and stores, offices, factories and dwellings were all gay with flags, bunting, evergreens and other decorative materials. Owing to the shortness of the royal visit, the citizens did not feel called upon to decorate upon such a costly, lavish scale as was the case in Toronto, where the stay of the royal party extended over several days. The appearance of the streets was of the whole, especially creditable to the city, especially after considering the deleterious effect of the morning's rain upon the decorations employed.

Looking along the streets selected for the route of the royal procession, the number of flags and the yards of bunting to be seen could only be reckoned in the thousands. Practically every building had its quota of garish embellishment to testify to the royal visitors that the capital of Western Ontario was proud and happy to have them as guests, if only for a little more than a brief hour.

Especially effective were the decorations on the various public buildings.

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ings along the line of procession. General disappointment was expressed, however, at the tardy nature of the decorations by the outside contractor, for which the city paid a good sum. They consisted of shields, surrounded by banners, affixed to the trolley poles, with an occasional streamer. The effect was much more like a circus or trained dog show than a reception to royalty.

The city hall was decorated in a most fitting and appropriate manner. The archway was draped with curtains, with a large coat of arms above. In large letters on a blue background was the word "Welcome." On either side purple drapery extended across the building. Large Union Jacks fluttered from the top windows, while shields of national flags and colors were tastefully arranged on the front of the city's chief building.

The decorations on both the G. T. R. station and city ticket office were much admired. Suspended from the face of the station veranda, from end to end of the long structure, was bunting of red, yellow and blue, entwined with evergreen. A number of shields with flags were arranged at intervals along the upper side of the veranda, and on the front of the building was a profusion of bunting and flags. In the apex was a crown surmounted by flags. At the city ticket office a similar scheme of decoration was employed.

The custom house decorations were ordered from Ottawa by the government. Over the main entrance to the building, Richmond street, there was the British coat of arms, partially surrounded by Union Jacks. There were a number of shields with flags on the front of the structure, and from the clock tower, strung in several directions, were ropes, attached to which were scores of pennons, in various colors. There were a number, also, strung from the flag staff.

At the postoffice the decorations, like those of the custom house, were ordered from Ottawa. A Union Jack was placed above the entrance, with national flags on either side. A number of set pieces covered the face of the building, while directly in the center at the top a massive coat of arms was prominently in view. A large Union Jack flanked itself at the top of the building, while ropes with numberless pennons were attached thereto.

The decorations on the Public Library were such as to cause the most favorable comment. The display of red, white and blue bunting added much to the appearance of the building, while the windows were most artistically draped in curtain fashion with the national colors.

Large numbers of shields, of flags, and national colors adorned the Collegiate Institute, while flags and purple shields added to the appearance of the Y. M. C. A.

The C. P. R. ticket office was neatly decorated. A streamer of red, white and blue bunting was stretched across the building on Richmond street, and caught at regular intervals with roses of maple leaves. Flags were over the doorway. Above, bunting was placed horizontally across the building, while flags fluttered from the windows. Probably the most elaborate and effective decoration done on any other than a public building was that of the Tecumseh House. The entire front on Richmond street was decked in the British colors, all the lower windows being beautifully draped with bunting, surmounted by the British coat of arms, with intervening ornaments of maple leaves and wreaths. The portico was one mass of bunting, the columns and side walls being overspread with this material. Across the central part of the building was a banner bearing the words, "Loyal Greetings," in large letters. From every window there waved by hundreds flags, large and small. All gave token of the good feelings entertained by the host and hostess toward the royal family and their visiting representatives. All the decorations were bought new by the proprietor of the Tecumseh House, everything offered at second-hand being rejected.

HOW THE DUKE'S CIGARS WERE LOST

Ten Thousand Went Down in the Wreck of the Lusitania.

London Express: Private advice to a London tobacco dealer give the information that some seven thousand of the costly cigars shipped for the use of the Duke of Cornwall and his suite while in Canada have been recovered from the hull of the wrecked liner Lusitania, on the east coast of Newfoundland. In all ten thousand of the highest class of cigars, intended for royal use, were on the Lusitania, packed in hermetically sealed cases. They were consigned to the citadel at Quebec, to await the arrival of the Ophir. Each cigar was valued at 3s.

So the cases were the costly "smokes" that, in case the crew might break open the cases, they were packed in the extreme stern of the ship and bolted behind heavy plating. When it became known to the islanders that the duke's cigars were part of the Lusitania's cargo, a patrol was established to search for boxes on the beach.

All the smokers on the island revelled in dreams of cigars without stint. Speculators wanted them also, but their dreams came to nothing. Divers, after ten weeks' work, have now got at the cigars, and, according to the cable, have saved seven thousand in good condition. The other three thousand were washed out of the wreck. Meanwhile, however, the duke's cigar order had been duplicated in London, rejected as unworthy.
