## FROM NIAGARA

Duck Hunter Rescued, But His Boat, Gun and Ducks Go Over the Falls.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Jan. 9.-Fred Truesdale had a narrow escape from death on Monday. He is an old river man and was out duck hunting, when his boat caught in an ice floe. He could not reach open water, but float-ed down stream with the ice. William Kolleran saw Truesdale's predicament from the shore and hurried to Willow Island with a rope, which he threw to him as he came gun and ducks went over the Falls It was one of the most thrilling rescues ever made at the Falls.

EASTERN DAIRYMEN. Whitby, Ont., Jan. 9.—The 25th annual convention of the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association opened here yesterday. President Derbyshire, in his inaugural address, discussed the condition of the cheese-making branch of the industry, with shrinking shipments and lowering prices on the English market. Mr. Fisher, minister of agriculture, in a lengthy survey of the Canadian dairy industry, attributed the present condition of cheese-making to three causes. First, lack of ventilated chambers in the hold of ocean vessels, carrying cheese product to England; second the lack of properly ventilated railway cars between factory and port of shipment. This the railways, during prosperous times now prevailing, are unable to furnish. He hoped, however, to be able to accomplish something along this line the coming session. Third, the lack of proper curing houses in connection with most cheese factories. He suggested the possibility of supplying this want in co-operative cold storage and curing houses to serve a dozen or more fac-tories in a district.
