Peaches and grapes Vegetables and Roots-The supply of potatoes was large, amounting to several hundred bags; sales were made at 80c

to 90c per bag; quite a few sold at 85c; the demand was on the slow side. There were plenty of other vegetables, which were held at prices quoted. Poultry—There was considerable poultry offered, including several large loads of live chickens, which went at 6c to se per pound, live weight: dressed chickens sold at 50c to 80c per pair; dressed ducks went at 75c to \$1 per pair, or 9c per pound.

Dressed Hogs-There were 50 to 60 car-cases offered, selling at \$7.25 to \$7.70 per 100 pounds, mostly at \$750.
