Jap Guns Destroyed.

Mukden, July 26.—The latest reports received here are to the effect that the Russians, with about 100 guns in action in the Ta Tche Kiao engagement, inflicted serious losses on the Japanese, and destroyed many of their guns. The Japanese attack on the center of the Russian position was repuised, but the Russians were ordered to retire yesterday and occupy a village ten miles south of Ta Tche Kiao. This movement was carried out in good order.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES DOWN

Call for a Total Expenditure of \$11,839,270.

Ottawa, July 25. — Supplementary estimates tabled by Hon. W. S. Fielding late this evening contain a large number of items of interest to Canadians generally. The total amount called for by this blue book is \$11,839,-270 72. The main estimates for 1904-5 submitted early in the session called for \$62,935,338 84. The total is, therefore, \$73,774,609 56. Of course, a considerable portion of both sums is made up of expenditures on capital account. As prophesied in yesterday's dispatch, there is a vote for the commencement of the Georgian Bay Canal. The item reads as follows: "Survey for waterway between Georgian Bay and Montreal, via French and Ottawa Rivers, \$250,000." Another item under the heading, "Transportation facilities," is \$55,-000 for the eastern breakwater at Port
