It is not likely, however, that the race will be taken from Toronto, as the C. A. A. U. officials believe it would detract from the interest in the final trials to be held here.

TO FOUR HITSCheck, of Cleveland, Pitches
Nice Three-to-One Victory
Against Champions.

Cleveland, April 27.—Charley Check celebrated his 29th birthday today by administering a defeat to the Detroit champions. He almost got a shutout of it, but because Nill contributed an error the man with the birthday had to be content with a 3-to-1 victory, which gets him just as much in the league record.

Check held the champions down to four hits, his raise ball being most effective with the men on base. Despite their lack of safe ones the Tigers placed residents on the sacks on numerous occasions. They had one out, but failed to get a man home. Again in the sixth they had a man on third with only one out, yet failed to score the individual in question.

Nice Base Running. The base running of the Naps was what helped a heap in the gathering of the three runs that placed Cleveland on Easy street. A stolen base was absolutely necessary in the scoring of the first run, and it also helped in the second, while the third was due to the fact that George Stovall took a chance and scored from second base on what looked to be an infield out.

In consequence of Terry Turner having thrown his arm out of whack, Nill was sent to short and he got a bad start by having three errors chalked up against him. Nevertheless he proved strong in pinches and accepted eight chances.

HUGHEY JENNINGS
LEGAL EXPERT

Tyrus Cobb submits to all interviewers and the busy scribbles along Detroit's line of travel have played up the southern in full-face type. When asked by a Louisville scribe to give his opinion of the "Merry Widow" hat, Cobb remarked: "I do not wear one; a derby suits me." Other stars on the team have been interviewed to the extent of columns. Jennings is perhaps the most-talked-about member of the team. Well versed on topics and a student of things politic, his expressions are interesting except where the interviewer garbles the stuff.

An instance cropped up in Evansville, when the court reporter, acting as sub for the sport editor, talked to Hughey about five minutes. The account, which appeared in the afternoon paper, follows: "Sitting in the court of the Gridley Hotel, Manager Jennings of the champion Detroit Tigers, passed sentence on the American League rule. He said that the fight would be between Detroit, Chicago, New York and Philadelphia. He showed no leniency in scoring Cleveland, which he believes is a second division team. The playing docket has Cleveland to open in Detroit, where Manager Jennings says judgment will be dealt out. The Tigers will ride to the park today in a "bus."

BOSTON SCRIBE
GETS IN WRONG

Sporting Life: A Boston contemporary in speaking of the numerous defeats of major league teams by minor league teams, ranking even so low as Class C, remarks: "Even the bush league teams are taking games from the big league record." This is a wrong conclusion. The real cause of the major league's defeats is not due to the increased strength of the minor league teams, but to the operation and effect of the foul-strike rule. Under that rule, a bush league pitcher with a good day on and fair fielding support, is quite likely to beat a world's champion team. The foul-strike rule has not pulled minor league teams up so much as it has pulled major league teams back from the higher plane on which the pick of the world's best batsmen formerly placed it.

NEW SWIMMING RECORD

Los Angeles, April 28.—Kenneth Kellogg of Occidental College, established a new Southern California record at swimming under water in a tournament at Bimini last night, by going 156 feet before coming to the surface. He traversed the length of the tank twice and was under water 1 minute and 10 seconds. Kellogg already held the championship at Bimini, having swum 172 feet. A. Scholtz was second with a distance of 130 feet.
