

Bylaw Guaranteeing Bonds o Cement Company To Be Re-Submitted to Voters.

[Special to The Advertiser.] St. Marys, April 21. — A special meeting of the town council was held Wednesday evening to consider the matter of resubmitting the guaranteeing of the \$40,000 bonds to the cement by a large majority. Mr. L. Harstone, solicitor for the company, in addressing the council, said that owing to the delay in securing Niagara power, the proposed company was placed in a very serious position of not knowing whether they would have the promised Niagara power or have to change the plans of the machinery to suit steam power, which made the bylaw voted on last year of practically n_0 use to them. Although the council has the power to extend the time for the operations of the bylaw, the company did not wish them to assume that responsibility, which would give room for cavilling by opponents of the bylaw; but they ask the council to resubmi it to the people and have their approval by another vote Some changes, he said, are to be made in the new bylay, such as to extend the time of payment to ten years, instead of five, and while no provision was made in the old bylaw, the new one would have a sinking fund by installments laid past after the third year of passing the by-law.
